Dear Friends in Christ,

Last October I traveled to Missouri and made my annual retreat at Conception Abbey, a Benedictine monastery. It was a refreshing time in prayer and renewal with God in the midst of a prayerful and welcoming community. It was sorely needed after missing such retreats in 2020 due to the pandemic.

Recently I received notification that Conception Abbey will no longer be livestreaming their daily hours of prayer and the daily Mass. Rather, only special occasions—such as the profession of new monks—will be live streamed to the public.

The monastery did not elaborate on how they arrived at the decision to scale back the livestream option. However, they did express their hope that visitors will still continue to offer their daily prayer and stay connected with their local communities. The monks also hope that when possible, guests will come and visit the abbey in person and to know that they are always welcome to pray in the abbey church together with the monks.

The Work of the People

My hunch is that the monks were concerned that as we come out of the pandemic, we may need an extra nudge (or even a push?) to get back to our "in person" sense of community. Yes, livestream is a blessing when "in person" is not possible, but it was never intended to be a permanent replacement.

I sometimes wonder if there are those in our community here at St. Charles who need the extra invitation, nudge, or push to come back to the Mass. To be clear, the Ohio bishops **ended** that dispensation for the obligation to participate

in Sunday Mass in May 2021. Of course, anyone who is ill or upon doctor's orders may not be in the company of other people are still excused from participating in Mass. However, the idea that **everyone** has an "option" to take part in Mass whether in person or online is not true.

In fact, the English word "liturgy" is derived from the Greek and means "public work or service." Liturgists may argue if it means "work of the people" or "work for the people" but it does require active participation on the part of both the priest and the people. And in this situation, online "participation" does not work. The priest together with the people around the altar offer their sacrifice to almighty God.

While some may argue that the priest is the most essential participant in the Mass, I would argue that the assembly is just as essential. When we were in lockdown, I was so grateful that Fr. Thomas was there. We took turns providing the people's responses when the other was the priest celebrant at Mass. It was a great joy at the end of May 2020 when we could finally re-open our doors to you all for Mass. Your prayerful responses were truly music to our ears.

If you, or someone you know, has not yet made "a return" to Mass, I encourage you to give it some effort. Life is too short to go it alone. We need to be in connection with the faith community that unites us with one another and God as well.

I would also like to use this opportunity to express thanks for those who are faithful liturgical ministers here at St. Charles. Recently I was thinking about how a worthy celebration of Mass takes more than just the offering of the priest. Consider these ministers and the important contribution of time and talent they offer:

The **Sacristan**. Kenny Koester, Bob Proby, and Kathy Burkholder faithfully attend to the needs of preparing the church, altar, and the needs of the other liturgical ministers for each Sunday Mass.

The Lyric Screen Tech. Since the introduction of our lyric screens in church in the summer of 2021 we now require someone to run the screens from the AV Desk (in the St. Charles section) at each Mass when they are in use.

The **Sound Tech**. Someone monitors the sounds system from the AV Desk, turning microphones on and off as needed and adjusting volume.

The **Producer.** For the use of multi-cameras including close-ups and change of views, a live person operates (or "produces") a special Mass each weekend (usually the 10:30 a.m.) which is streamed not just on our website platform but also through our Facebook page.

The **Lector.** Roughly 20 parishioners are on our roster of weekend lectors who prepare to proclaim the readings and offer the petitions during the Universal Prayer. Oh yes, those who are physically able, process with the large Book of Gospels in the entrance procession and place it on the altar.

The **Altar Servers**. About 35 youth in grades 5-12, whether at a Catholic school or public school are prepared to serve at Sunday Mass. Each year we welcome new youth into the ministry.

The **Greeters**. With four entrances, we need more greeters than most parishes! Ideally each of our weekend Masses has eight greeters to welcome our regulars and visitors alike!

The **Ushers.** With four aisles, we need eight ushers to help pass the basket and distribute bulletins.

The Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. Prior to the pandemic we needed fifteen ministers in addition to the priest. Currently we need nine ministers. We have roughly 132 parishioners commissioned in this ministry.

The **Cantor**. Each Mass requires a cantor to chant the psalm between the readings and to inspire the sung participation of the assembly.

The **Musicians**. Each Mass has at minimum a pianist and/or organist. Often additional instruments are added to make our prayer to God even more powerful.



...and Family Sharing

Family Promise's new campus is buzzing with activity these days. Currently at full capacity, hosting six families in its bedroom quarters, the center's reach is growing and serving more of the local homeless population than ever before.

It was a wonderful experience from start to finish. Everyone involved enjoyed the evening, and the families made many comments of appreciation. Family Promise staff also voiced their thanks for such a fruitful event, and they expressed their inter-

The summer has officially come to an end. Saturday, we ended our summer youth program with a canoe trip on the Auglaize River. As I was floating down the river with a canoe full of river rocks and clam shells and watching one of the canoes meander from one bank to the next as they tried to navigate the river, I began to think about the upcoming school year, our youth, and the stones and the meandering canoe.

So many of us, especially our youth, are like the meandering canoe, going from one bank to the next and sometimes ending up going down stream backwards. We try our hardest to get our canoe headed in the right direction, but no matter how hard we paddle it just doesn't happen. Sometimes we can get the bow of our canoe pointed down stream and we get it together and paddle with the cur-

rent, but eventually we start to think that we know what we are doing and we start to fight the current. Next thing you know, we are meandering down the river again bouncing off the river banks.

Our youth are being pulled from one bank to the next. Our culture wants to tell them how to think, what to believe, and how to act. So many times, this fights the current. They are struggling to understand what it is that they believe and fighting to figure out who they are. Sometimes they get it right, sometimes they don't. This is where we, as parents, grandparents, aunt, uncles, teachers and friends have to help them steer. We have to remind them that they are beloved children of God and even

if they were the last person on Earth, Jesus would have lived, suffered his passion, and died on the cross for them. When they get it right, we need to love them and praise them for it. When they get it wrong, we need to love them and remind them that God loves them too, even when they mess up. We are all living stones, chosen and precious in the eyes of God. We need to let God's love flow over us and shape us into what He wants us to be.

This morning, as I am sitting down to write this, the LCC students are starting to pull into the parking lot to begin a new school year, and the students in the other schools are either anticipating heading back to school later this week or next. With the kick off of the school year, this means that our youth programs will be kicking off as well.

Edge (the middle school program) and Life-Teen (the high school program) will kick off on September 18th

> with a cook out and color battle, and will continue weekly on Sundays, throughout the school year. On December 11th, there is a high school XLT (Praise & Worship event) at St. John the XXIII in Perrysburg. On April 2nd

there is another high school XLT Event at St. Joseph's in Maumee. These are just some of the events that are already on the calendar and I know more will be coming. You are able to register through the St. Charles website, or pick up a registration form from the parish office or next to the bulletins in the Church. There will also be two registration weekends, after Mass, on September 10th, 11th, 17th, and 18th.

The **Choirs**. Here at St. Charles we have five choirs or regular "ensembles" of singers and musicians. The "adult choir" sings at a weekend Mass most Sundays during the school year. The "children's choir" sings for various special occasions throughout the school year. The "bell choir" rings out joy at a Mass about once a month. The "quartet" is a small vocal ensemble that adds to the solemnity at a Mass about once a month. The "Life Teen band" gives a contemporary sound to our liturgical music normally at the Sunday evening Mass during the school year. In addition, St. Charles Catholic School has several additional musicians and singers for the weekday school Masses.

If I add up the numbers above, each weekend we have as many one hundred liturgical ministers each weekend, just for our three regular Sunday Masses. Even more are required when choirs are added or we include the needs of the Sunday evening Mass.

By all means, if you have an interest in any of the above ministries, please leave your name and contact information with our office so that we can direct your interest to the proper person who coordinates that particular ministry. Obviously, some ministries require more preparation and formation than others. We can also help you discern which ministries are best suited for the gifts and skills that are yours.

On a final note, September always marks the return of our Sunday evening Mass. Our first Mass of this year will be Sunday, September 18, at 5:30 pm. This Mass was introduced especially for our youth and their families more than twenty years ago when St. Charles began Life Teen. Originally other Lima parishes participated in both the Mass and the Life Night to follow.

Beginning in the fall of 2020–when the public celebration of Mass resumed after the lockdown-the other parishes in Lima had decided to no longer participate in Lima Life Teen. While everyone is still welcome here on Sunday evenings, Life Teen is now a ministry provided by just St. Charles Parish. Previously, the other parishes also supplied priest celebrants for the additional Mass as well as youth participants and adult team members for the Life Night to follow.

This summer, Fr. Thomas was reassigned to become the pastor of parishes in Gibsonburg and Millersville. With his move, I am the sole priest for all of our weekend Masses. I am happy to offer four weekend Masses here at St Charles, but I know too that we need plenty of support for the other ministries. Most importantly, we need the participation of the assembly in order to keep it flourishing here at our parish.

I hope you will all do your part to honor God with your active and faithful participation in one of our four weekend Masses.

Growing in Faith

The next step in the process after you have had an Encounter with Christ, is to begin learning how to FOLLOW Him. The Following Christ series is an opportunity for you to learn how to be a follower of Jesus with topics like: Daily Personal Prayer Life, Hearing God in Scripture, The Power of the Sacraments, Forgiveness, The Spirit Empowered Life, Dealing with Temptation, and more. This series will begin on Tuesday October 25, 2022 at 6:45 p.m. The following Christ series is seven weeks and includes a day retreat. If you desire to grow in faith, but feel stuck and are looking for a way to go deeper in your relationship with Christ, this is for you. Registration is available on the website. We especially want to invite everyone who has done ALPHA in the past, attended bible studies, gone on retreats, or anyone that has a strong relationship with Christ to come and join us to learn how we can better FOLLOW CHRIST together.

In January we will be offering **Discovering**Christ as well as **Sharing** Christ. Our goal is to have different levels of formation for men and women at our parish. There is never a one size fits all program that will meet everyone's needs. So, our goal is to have things at the shallow end of the pool for people who just want to dip their toes back in the waters of faith like **Discovering** Christ, or an **Encounter Retreat**. Then for those who are looking to go up to their knees we have **Following** Christ, and finally for those who are ready to dive into the deep end we have **Sharing** Christ, and The Seventy.

I pray that you will consider finding some way to grow deeper in your faith this year. Whether it is one of the programs we are offering here at the parish, or if you are too busy then perhaps you could visit FORMED.org to find a way to grow in your relationship/knowledge of God. Whatever you do, let's make this a year that begins and ends with putting Christ at the center of our lives. I am writing this on the Feast of the Assumption, and we are finishing our first 24-hour Eucharistic Adoration during these three years of Eucharistic Revival. The Miracle of Music

Music is organic. I would argue that all things organic are precisely designed—consciously or not. What interests me in music is the variety of forms, timbres, and expressions. It follows my deep love of nature, the precision and creativity of living, of survival. I find all of it a great miracle.

The culture of taste is another thing. Here, I find myself merging with music in a feeling of connection meaningful to me as an individual in association with my upbringing and interests. Whether it be a harmonic shift that pulls at my heartstrings, or the words to a tune that speak to me, or perhaps the rhythmic setting that inspires me, I know when I like a song or not, and because music is my education and life, I can tell you precisely why. But the why is not necessary for feelings. Everyone knows when they like a song or not. Music is egalitarian. Still, many people attach stigmas to those who like what is different from one's own cultural tastes. Why?

I will tend to argue the merits of a piece based on the purpose of it. For example, technodance music need not have interesting counterpoint (think Bach). In fact, if it did, it would not be in style. But I appreciate innovation that stretches the stylistic boundaries. When it's right, it survives. When it's not, it becomes a passing fad. That is the difference between true artistry and the bulk of commercial music production. And that is what becomes a living stone in the foundation of future works. Progress, or evolution, if you will. Yet many will feel a song deeply, despite the life expectancy created by the merits of its sum. There is validity in music when it can communicate feeling alone.

So, what to do with so many cultural tastes to satisfy? I follow the Lydgate quote, "You can please some of the people all of the time, you can please all of the people some of the time, but you can't please all of the people all of the time". And thus, I try to program everything from Appalachian tunes, old hymn standards, Spirituals, re-constituted classical tunes, Folk tunes, Contemporary Pop, 70's-80's-90's Pop, and much more. Important to note, I will typically consider tempo, key/mode, words, and style for placement. Will I ever program am upbeat hymn during Presentation of Gifts/Offertory? Probably not. Why? It's a more reflective moment in the Mass. Do the readings influence which hymns I choose? Absolutely! Sometimes I keep things in line with the mood of the reading. Other times, I choose a hymn that offers the same sentiment in an ironic way, usually the key/mode is opposite than expected based on the words alone. Looking at and hearing music is very much like examining a multi-faceted prism. Turning it repeatedly in various directions reflects more ideas than a two-dimensional piece of

Fortunately, I have many paths available to me in this job to express a large variety of tastes. The weekend Masses and St. Charles Catholic School morning Masses, the Concert Series, and the special Parish Mission all offer opportunities to hear a variety of styles. Lifeteen and special Holy Day Masses also add to the mix. The delivery of these various styles also adds texture to the presentation. Choir, bell choir, the various cantors, guest artists, ensembles, all add their individual flair and effort to make each delivery a unique creation. It all happens organically, based on the experience and connection of the person performing and delivering their gift.
