A Call to Orders: Ordination to the Order of Deacons

Dear Friends in Christ,

When you hear of a *Call to Orders* what comes to mind? "Call to orders" is the terminology used by the Church when it comes to the immediate preparation for ordination. Most often, we think of it for the ordination of a deacon or a priest, but it can also be used in the ordination of a bishop.

On March 18, three seminarians of our diocese received the call to Orders for the diaconate. One was parishioner Kevin McGraw; another was my cousin from Glandorf, Eric Kaufman; and the third was our neighbor from Bluffton, Travis Kahle. With the help of the seminary staff, our Vocations Director, Fr. Phil Smith, and other priests and members of staff in parishes where they have assisted these past years of formation, Bishop Thomas discerned that they are ready for the next step toward becoming a priest.

Kevin, Eric, and Travis will be ordained to the (transitional) diaconate at Rosary Cathedral on Saturday, May 18, at 10:00 a.m. Everyone is invited to this joyous Mass for our diocese. God willing, after a year serving as transitional deacons, the three will be ordained priests—once again at Rosary Cathedral.

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St. Charles Catholic Church 2200 West Elm Street Lima, Ohio 45805 Deacon Fred and Deacon Jon were also ordained to the same diaconal ministry but as "permanent" deacons. This means they are not aspiring to be

priests, but are prepared to serve as deacons. A permanent deacon must be at least 35 years old and if married, he will need the explicit support of his wife and family before proceeding with formation and discernment.

To be clear, nobody can be ordained to the diaconate or priesthood unless he is first called to orders by a bishop who has been appointed to lead a diocese. The apostolic nuncio (an ambassador for the pope appointed for a particular nation in the world) makes the "call to orders" for any new bishop to be ordained in that nation.

The Rite of Ordination takes place during a Mass after the proclamation of the Gospel. The candidates are presented to the bishop. Then, after an examination or inquiry of the candidates, the bishop will "elect" them to be ordained. He will declare that he has chosen the candidates to be ordained. This is reminiscent of the "election" by the early Christian community when they chose the first seven deacons. Once elected, the bishop will then preach the homily, instructing the candidates on what it means to be a deacon.

Next, the candidates will make their promise of celibacy which is followed by an examination that includes a promise of prayer. All diaconate candidates who are unmarried (whether for transitional or permanent) make a promise of celibacy during the ordination. Those candidates for the permanent diaconate who are married at the time

of ordination promise to not remarry should their wife precede them in death.

Then each candidate goes individually to the bishop and places his joined hands in those of the bishop as he makes his promise of obedience to the bishop and his successors. Once all have completed this, the bishop invites the people to pray that the "Father will mercifully pour out his blessings on these servants whom, in his kindness, he raises to the sacred Order of the diaconate."

Afterwards, in one of the more dramatic moments in the liturgy, all the

diaconal candidates will lie prostrate on the floor, while everyone else will kneel in prayer for them. At this time, the litany of the saints is chanted. We are reminded that not only the faithful on earth, but also the entire Church in heaven is praying for these men.

Bishop Thomas will then extend his hands over all the candidates. This begins the most important part of the ceremony—the ordination itself. He prays the prayer of consecration and asks God to draw near, recalling the gift of the first deacons. The bishop continues, "Send forth upon them, Lord, we pray, the Holy Spirit, that they may be strengthened by the gift of your sevenfold grace for the faithful

As May Visitation approaches, I am excited to share updates on the upcoming capital projects at St. Charles Borromeo Parish. Your continued support is vital in ensuring the improvement and maintenance of our church grounds, and I urge you to consider contributing to this long-standing campaign.

This season, our focus turns to essential repairs before embarking on a significant addition to our infrastructure: the installation of a much-needed elevator. While we eagerly anticipate this transformative project, we must address immediate needs to safeguard our beloved church sanctuary.

Cupola Stained Glass Window Repairs

One pressing concern is the deterioration of the cupola stained glass windows. Over the years, water penetration has caused damage to the window framing, leading to multiple leaks during rainstorms and harm to the church pews. To rectify this, we plan to remove the stained-glass panels, reframe the window structure, and then replace the double pane clear galss on the outside, then return the stained glass to its original place. This essential project is estimated to cost approximately \$91,728, not including the cost to move and temporarily store the stained glass. We do however have an anonymous donor who has already contributed \$50,000 towards this project, making the church's cost much less.

Additionally, we must address the disintegrating concrete along the east sidewalk, spanning from the church's roof overhang to the Gathering Space. This area, crucial for congregation and visitor access, requires immediate attention to ensure safety and aesthetics. The estimated cost for this repair is \$15,900. Furthermore, we anticipate replacing the remaining sidewalks surrounding the church in phases, with a significant portion being addressed as part of the elevator construction project.

Elevator Addition

While our plans for the elevator are underway, with an estimated cost of \$600,000, we are diligently working through quotes and seeking approval from the Diocese. We anticipate the construction to take place sometime in 2025, which is not as soon as we wished. A combination of factors has contributed to this delay, such as coordination of a multitude of contractors, and a deluge of Capital Project approval requests through the Diocese as a result of the Living Christ Campaign.

As previously mentioned, we have reserved funds to cover any shortfalls from Living Christ Campaign pledges. However, we appeal to your generosity to ensure we have sufficient resources, especially considering unforeseen complications and rising inflation.

As we approach Visitation Sunday, I urge our parish families to contribute generously to

support these crucial endeavors. Your donations play a pivotal role as we advance toward realizing our vision for St. Charles Borromeo Parish.

Together, let us continue to enhance our parish community and ensure that St. Charles Borromeo remains a beacon of faith, fellowship, and service for generations to come.

carrying out the work of the ministry." He then intercedes for them, asking the Lord to grant them growth in holiness.

After this, each candidate goes to the bishop and kneels before him. The bishop lays his hands on the candidate's head, in silence. This is the "laying on of hands" found in the first ordination. The man is ordained a deacon.

After all the candidates have been ordained, assisting deacons or priests will help the new deacons put on first a deacon's stole and then a vestment called the dalmatic.

Each newly ordained deacon then goes to the bishop and kneels before him. The bishop places the Book of the Gospels in the hands of the newly ordained, saying, "Receive the Gospel of Christ whose herald you have become. Believe what you read, teach what you believe, and practice what you teach."

Finally, the bishop stands and gives the kiss of peace to each new deacon. The Celebration of the Eucharist then continues as usual.

I hope that you will consider going to the cathedral to pray for Kevin and his classmates. If you are not able to travel to Toledo, you can also watch on livestream at: www.toledopriesthood.org.

Anyone who wishes to carpool to the cathedral can just meet in the St. Charles parking lot by 7:30 a.m. on that Saturday morning. It takes about 75 minutes to get there, but getting there a little early will not only help in getting a good seat, but also provide time to appreciate the artwork and beauty of our cathedral. A light reception will follow the Ordination Liturgy next door to the cathedral in the Monsignor Bernard Smith Auditorium.

Then on Sunday, May 19, the brand-new Deacon Kevin McGraw will be back at St Charles assisting and preaching at both our 8:00 am and 10:30 am Masses. I definitely hope to see you all present on this very special Pentecost Sunday!

In these final weeks before ordination, please join me in praying for Kevin and the other candidates as they open their hearts and their very lives to the will of God.

a channel to listen. Connect with Bluetooth hearing aids, cochlear implants, or even your own earbuds! Use the QR code to download the Listen Everywhere app, or follow the steps below.



- At church, go on your phone, and go to settings, Wi-Fi, and click the Network titled: Church Listening. Enter the password: Church Listening.
- Once connected, go to the App Store and search, Listen Everywhere. It is a light blue icon with a headphones symbol. Click Get.
- Once installed, open the app. There may be a notification. Choose Allow. You will see that you are connected to 2 audio channels. Click on the 1st channel to listen.

In February, the children learned the sacrament of Anointing the Sick is one of the seven sacraments, especially intended to give strength to those who are suffering from a serious illness. The outward signs of Anointing the Sick are the oil, the laying on of hands, the prayer, and the priest. They also discovered only a priest is the minister of this sacrament, anointing the sick on the forehead and hands with duly blessed oil, pressed from olives and blessed by the bishop.

Children identified the parts of the Mass

Children identified the parts of the Mass where healing can be experienced by all. These parts include the Confiteor, the Our Father, and during Holy Communion. Emphasis was placed on the Holy Eucharist providing food to assist the sick on their journey as well as provide spiritual strength and forgiveness.

The older children also discovered that the sacrament oAnointing the Sick is mentioned in the bible, specifically James 5:13-16. Each class had an age appropriate story to read containing information on the sacrament of the Sick. The children in grades K-3 read "Grandma's Anointing". Children in grades 4-5 read "My Anointing," based on a true story.

Parents were encouraged to call the Parish Office to schedule an appointment when a family member or loved one has been seriously ill for a while, or is physically weak due to age or illness, or maybe they will be having a serious operation, or dying. We talked about trying to call early enough so their loved one can receive the Eucharist and Reconciliation. If our loved one is reluctant, they may just need some encouragement to receive the sacrament.

During our second session in February, we began refreshing our understanding of Lent and the children identified their Lenten Promises. We began with a short Brother Francis video, "Let's Learn About Lent." Brother helped children identify Ash Wednesday as the beginning of Lent, and Good Friday as the end. Brother Francis said the reason ashes are put on our forehead was to remind us that one day God will call our souls to heaven and the ashes help us to remember God is our creator.

The children discovered Lent was a time for us to think about the actions in our own life not pleasing to God. Jesus showed us how to do this when he went out in the desert and prayed for 40 days, after he was baptized. Brother Francis said we should follow Jesus and pray for the 40 days of Lent, with our family and the church. It is important for us to think about the things which may make us sin so we can ask God for help to turn away from sin and grow closer to him. For example, our anger could lead us to be mean to others and say or do things that are hurtful. Brother Francis said Reconciliation is a good way cleanse our hearts of sin.

Sacraments, Lent, and the Ten Commandments

We went through the rules of fasting and how fasting is a sacrifice. Sacrifice can make us stronger spiritually in our hearts and bring us closer to God. We discussed other sacrifices we could make. A couple of examples were giving up television and instead help Mom, Dad, or a sibling during this time. Maybe we could save our money instead of spending it on ourselves and give the money we save to the poor. It is important to talk to your parents ahead of Lent so your parents can help you decide what you can do for Lent.

The Stations of the Cross are an important prayer which reminds us of how much Jesus loves us. The older students led the parents and younger children in The Stations of the Cross. The younger children held up pictures of each station and we ended them with a closing prayer.

Children worked with their parents to create a Lenten Promise each could try to complete over Lent this year. The children were encouraged to track their weekly success by selecting one of three different smiley emojis. The motto of the activity was, "Make small sacrifices each day to bring you closer to Jesus!"

In March, Deacon Fred Wuebker spoke to the parents on the topic of the 10 Commandments

while the children were with the catechists learning about them too. The Ten Commandments (Exodus 20) are not meant to bind us or fence us in, but to give freedom. In Matthew


19:16-22, you will find the story of a rich young man who asked Jesus how to get to heaven. Jesus told him, "If you wish to enter into life, keep the Commandments." When the man asked, "Which ones?" Jesus replied, "Do not commit murder: do not commit adultery; do not accuse anyone falsely; respect your father and your mother; and love your neighbor as you love yourself." There is great freedom in obedience, and we can obey God wholeheartedly because He has proven Himself worthy of our trust.

The Commandments can be divided into two categories: love and obedience to God, and love and respect of our neighbor. The first three commandments show how we can respond to God's love for us, while the next seven teach us how to treat our fellow man. We unite ourselves to God when we obey the Commandments.

The Ten Commandments are guidelines given to help us become holy and pleasing to God. The children know the commandments help us to be happy and safe. We can also use the commandments

to examine our conscience prior to Reconciliation.

We also read from *Our Sabbath Scripture Book* for the 5th Sunday of Lent. With the help of the Pauline family the children realized we may have to adjust our schedule and what we want to do, so we can serve others. Knowing how important serving is the children brainstormed some ways they could serve the Lord. The story was based on John 12:20-33.


