The four national pilgrimage routes converged in Indianapolis to begin the National Eucharistic Congress which was held July 17-21. A number of our parishioners joined thousands of others for this historic event. I invited two of them, Bert Vernon and Barry McCullough, to share their experiences that week.

The Revival continues this year. This is the year we all find ways to be Eucharistic missionaries. St. Charles is planning to offer again opportunities for additional time of adoration and another Eucharistic Procession. Keep your eye on the bulletin and website for more details!

My “Ah-Ha Moment” at the Eucharistic Congress

Maybe some of you will remember Oprah Winfrey saying that every so often during one of her famous talk shows? It was a way to explain how something finally made sense to her, or maybe she understood something in a totally different light.

I felt compelled to go to the Eucharistic Congress, but I didn’t really know why. I have to admit. I am not one who usually goes to regular Eucharistic Adoration when offered. Why would I go to a *national* one? Then, I saw I was to be in Findlay the day *after* I came home from being in Cincinnati for my son’s wedding! Findlay was where the diocesan pilgrims would gather and board the buses that would take us to the congress in Indianapolis. That would mean I would have to drive back up, unpack, throw everything in the washer and repack to head up early the next morning. I had already been away from my home for six days, and now I would be gone another five days from home?! No way. It was too hard. I was already emotionally drained at our son’s wedding – without Fred, my husband who died in 2018 – our first BIG major life moment for me and my son without his dad. But still...I found myself being

nudged to go. At the time, I didn’t even know anyone else who was going, so I offered up the extra bed in my suite to the Diocese when they asked for help in finding room for other attendees. I can laugh now, but the first time I was contacted and asked about this through email; the church asked if I would mind having another male roommate? I had to let them know that a roommate was fine, but since my full name is actually *Roberta*, I didn’t think the church would really approve of the male roommate!

There were so many beautiful moments throughout the five days in Indy! I met wonderful people from our own Diocese – Parishioners, Deacons, Seminarians – and even

Bishop Thomas rode our bus on the way home. I met people from Guam (cousins of a friend – small world!); a man who drove seven days from California – just to attend the weekend portion; a now-friend, who had flown in from Moldova (had to Google Map that one) a few days just before the buses left; and my wonderful roomie – a 23-year-old, faith-filled, prayerful young woman from the Cleveland area, who kept me on my toes praying *The Angelus*, which I had never even heard of! I realized we were *all* called in some way to attend, despite what was going on in our world...and we all just took the plunge and stepped-off in faith.

Awaken, Empower, Equip

The only question to ask at this point is, “What can we do about it?” The answer is very simple. We, as a parish, need to provide an atmosphere that fosters the same type of community they experience at camp. The good news is that we have that for both middle school and high school

Awaken, Empower, and Equip. These are the first three words that Catholic Youth Summer Camp focuses on. Awaken the youth to Jesus’ love and that he desires a relationship with them. Empower them to develop that relationship with Jesus through a life of daily prayer. Equip them to be able to live this type of holy life. They have a lot of methods at camp to help our youth achieve this goal, and one of the main ways is through high adventure activities which lead the youth to a high adventure faith.



This week, I have seen 7 of our youth stepping outside of their comfort zones, physically, psychologically, but most importantly spiritually. However, the fact of the matter is, as with all retreats, while at camp they are living on a mountain top. They are surrounded by other youth who are living the same life and they build community with them, they become their brothers and sisters in Christ, but when they get home all of the sudden they lose that community and support. Damascus tries to prepare the kids for the return to the “real world”, but the fact of the matter is the “real world” smacks them straight in the face when they get home.

We’ve had some shifts in staffing here at the Outreach Ministries Department of St. Charles! I have returned to the Director position at Christian Corner Community Center after serving in that role 3 years ago. The Center has since expanded services to feature a weekly food distribution in partnership with West Ohio Food Bank. The Food Bank delivery truck arrives at 7:00 a.m. every Wednesday packed full of fresh fruit, veggies, bagged salads and baked goods. A team of 15 volunteers helps to unload and set out these many consumable items. Volunteers make their own food boxes first, followed by members of the community. All of whom qualify according to USDA income guidelines.

Included in this distribution are members of the Haitian community, many of whom speak only Creole. We have a lovely teenage girl, Lougenia, who is bi-lingual and has been a huge help to us in communicating with this group of God’s people. Every July, income guidelines are updated and new forms must be signed. Lougenia did a lot of information translation at that time! She will be sorely missed when she begins Freshman year at Lima Senior High this fall.

Fr. Bertholy, the priest from Haiti who is spending the month of August here at St. Charles, will be present at all of the food distribution days in the month. We very much look forward to his communication with and discovery of the challenges and rewards being felt by these new residents of our community. Most importantly, how can we understand and serve them as Jesus would?

Christian Corner is open every Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., serving coffee and donuts early and free lunch later on. Clothing and household items are available to patrons at no charge every Monday and Friday. All parishioners and members of the community are welcome to come for lunch or a visit to see what we are all about!

So, in all these moments of awesomeness, including speakers like *The Chosen's* own Jesus, Jonathan Roumie and Fr. Mike Schmitz, I found one speaker opening my eyes to my "Ah-Ha Moment." During this Eucharistic Congress, I was understanding now that we are all called to be Eucharistic Missionaries. But what did that mean? How do you do this? Is this the call for *all of us* to attend more Eucharistic Adorations and pray before Jesus? It was

this tiny little nun with a big, powerful voice by the name of Mother Adela Galindo, who explained to us, it was our own Blessed Mother who was our first Eucharistic Missionary! She is a model of how we are to receive Christ in us and make a home for Him. We bear the presence of Jesus to others, just like she did. As a matter of fact, she had just been given the news she would be the *Mother of God (!)*, and what did she do? She chose to leave immediately to help her elderly cousin, whom she found out was also expecting. She traveled across the mountains that were

difficult and dangerous, only so she could serve Elizabeth in her old age. I had never thought of her response, *after* her initial "Yes!"

THAT was my "Ah-Ha Moment!" Just like my initial "yes" to attend the Eucharistic Congress, there is more afterwards: You move. You go. You do. We take Jesus into our body as His home every time we go to Mass. Our Blessed Mother, with Jesus in her womb, was the first, most beautiful Monstrance there was...but we can be that, too...for "what we freely receive, we must freely give." Our Blessed Mother went first to one person, her cousin, to share Jesus' love. That's all we have to do – find one person: a family member, a friend, an acquaintance, a co-worker, even a stranger – to share that love. That's what it means to be a Eucharistic Missionary.

My elevator speech on the National Eucharistic Congress?

I am still overwhelmed and will still agree I am a forever changed man. Wow! What an experience!! Wednesday through Sunday - every morning, afternoon, and evening brought new experiences, ideas, and a confirmation of my growing love of our savior Jesus Christ.

I was among 60,000 fellow Catholics in downtown Indianapolis. People of all ages (the young people were everywhere), all nationalities, and from all over the country and even world. There were over 200 bishops, many more priests, deacons, seminarians and religious sisters. Our Universal church was very evident to me.

I started to write notes for my elevator speech on Saturday afternoon as I was sitting in the capital square at the end of our eucharistic procession through the streets. What a powerful moment that was. My problem was condensing all that I experienced in a few words that could be finalized in a short trip on an elevator. There were SO many moments where the Spirit was moving through me... and I want to share them all. But to get to the point, here is my elevator speech – with a smile:

WOW – what an experience! No matter where you are in your faith life, we must never forget that we have been given this wonderful gift. It's so much more than any birthday or Christmas gift. This gift continues to give...over and over. This gift brings us true *joy* every day. This gift gives us *hope* on the toughest days. This gift is the *love* of our savior *Jesus Christ*. And to me, this gift is so evident when I open my eyes to his glory, and especially in prayer and eucharistic adoration. I recommend you go online – search the National Eucharistic Congress, and experience the revival. Check out the videos, read a few comments, and watch the talented and inspired presentations.

If there is still time on the elevator ride, and it seems that I have perked an interest in knowing more, I would share a few of the fantastic online opportunities I learned about to grow in faith. With that being said, I would stress that there is nothing as powerful as experiencing Jesus in the sacraments of reconciliation and the Holy Mass. Jesus is truly present to us in the Eucharist... and that gift available for free. This gift is so big we will never get it fully opened here on earth. To experience this wonderful gift of love, joy, and hope – we just need to start opening. We have an awesome God!

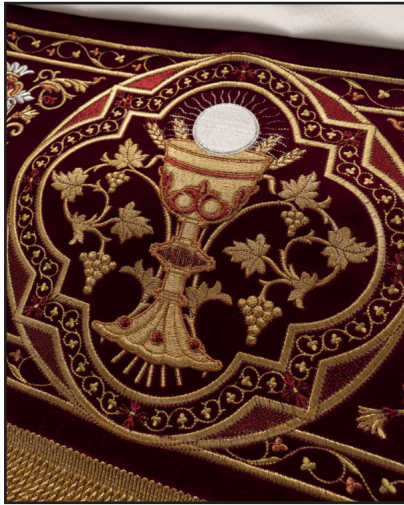
I am pleased to announce that I have submitted a grant application for the Rev. August Schaefer Endowment Fund on behalf of St. Charles Parish. You might recall, this is the grant we were awarded last year to receive our Worship Now Hymnals and accompaniments.

I hope you also recall the first Eucharistic Procession our parish hosted last year to celebrate the Year of Parish Revival within the National Eucharistic Revival. For this procession, we were blessed with great generosity from my home parish, St. Nicholas in Miller City, who allowed us to borrow their beautiful canopy. After seeing the success of the procession and the communal desire to continue this sacred tradition into the future, I was inspired to dedicate this year's grant application to the funding of our own Eucharistic Procession canopy.

Although there are many options for a canopy, our grant application specifically requests funds for a beautiful velvet canopy. After much prayer and input from our Liturgical Commission, this velvet canopy only seemed fitting, especially considering the Catechism's definition of sacred beauty - "Sacred art is true and beautiful when its form corresponds to its *particular vocation*: evoking and glorifying, in faith and adoration, the

transcendent mystery of God," (CCC 2502). The *particular vocation* of our canopy, being to usher our King amidst his people. Velvet, having been historically reserved for royalty, points us to Christ's kingship. At the same time, we are met in the monstrance with our King, who in the form of bread, has emptied and humbled himself, desiring to be among his people in simplest form. The combination of these symbols certainly point us to the transcendent mystery of Christ's kingship, drawing the human heart deeper in contemplation of the person of Christ.



In this, the third and final year of the Eucharistic Revival, we are called into a year of "Missionary Sending." We can respond to our missionary call through the witness of Eucharistic Processions. The Knights of Columbus describes this very well, "In Eucharistic Processions, the missionary aspect of the Eucharist is emphasized as we go forth into the world. Not only

gazing upon our Eucharistic Lord, but walking with him, we experience what the disciples did 2000 years ago as they walked with Jesus." The "vision" stated by the National Eucharistic Revival is, "To inspire a movement of Catholics across the United States who are *healed, converted, formed, and unified* by an encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist—and who are then sent out on mission "for the life of the world." I pray that the gift of hosting Eucharistic Processions in the years to come will foster just that. I encourage you to pray

with how you can invite others into this beautiful event, especially anyone who has experienced separation or woundedness from the Church. Let's do our best to lead them directly to Christ, whose "intention of instituting the Eucharist above all is to be near us to feed, to heal, and to comfort us," (Order For the Solemn Exposition of the Holy Eucharist, #7).



I look forward to this next step in our continued journey together towards fullness of life in Christ. We will be notified in October of the results of our application. It is likely that the grant (if approved) will not cover the entire cost of the canopy. 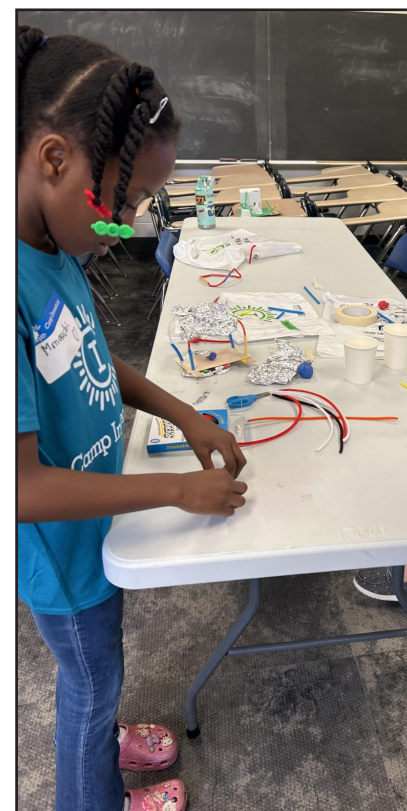

Primary Grades - Science of Reading Instruction with UFLI Program and LETRS Training

I piloted the UFLI program last year with my Kindergarten class and was impressed with the decoding skills and confidence to be word detectives! The students LOVE using the Sound wall and magnetic letters to

build words in our daily lessons. Research has proven that comprehension can occur WHEN 95% of the text is decoded. It makes perfect sense to be sure our students

can decode words proficiently so that reading comprehension can develop!

Students will learn 46+ phonemes or sounds that a letter, letters, or combination of letters make. Students are engaged in the SOUND WALL Activities daily to master these sounds to decode and encode words.

UFLI is an EXPLICIT AND SYSTEMATIC APPROACH to teach students to read words. It concentrates on the PHONETIC piece of a reading program. SCCS will continue to develop vocabulary and comprehension skills with the Wonders reading Program.

Most of our primary staff have YEAR ONE of the LETRS (Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling) training and will finish the LETRS Year TWO training by May 2025!! The LETRS Training and UFLI programs complement each other beautifully to help our youngest learners become proficient readers.
