Dear Friends in Christ,

Happy New Year! In fact, 2025 marks not just a "new" year but also a "Jubilee Year!" Yes, once again the Holy Door at St. Peter's in Rome and the other basilicas are now open for pilgrims to pass through in prayer.

The tradition of a Holy Year goes back to 1300 and Pope Boniface VIII. The practice of a Holy Door actually started at the pope's cathedral, St. John Lateran, in 1423. The Holy Year practice soon expanded to include all four major basilicas in Rome-St. John Lateran, St. Peter, St. Mary Major, and St. Paul Outsidethe-Walls.

Over the centuries, the timing of a Jubilee has varied from every 100 years to every 50 years (like the traditional Jewish Jubilee found in the Old Testament), to every 33 years (the age of Christ), and then every quarter century (the tradition today). The Jubilee Year 2025 will be the 28th time our Church has celebrated such a beautiful opportunity. The theme is recognizing that we are "Pilgrims of Hope."

When I lived in Rome (1988-1993) there was already preparation taking place for the great Jubilee Year of 2000. It would mark in a special way the second millennium since the birth of Christ. Pope John Paul II had a great desire to work on reconciliation for this Holy

Year-especially with other Christians and people of other

In particular, I recall how Pope John Paul II built upon his predecessor, Paul VI, and became the second

pope to travel to Jerusalem. In 1964, Pope Paul VI travelled to Jerusalem. That trip was historic not only for being the first pope to visit Jerusalem. It also marked the first time a reigning pontiff ever travelled on an airplane and was the first pope to leave Italy in 150 years!

When John Paul II went to Jerusalem in 2000 during the Holy Year he visited both Jews and Muslims alike.

He recognized that we are all monotheists and believe in the one, true God. In particular he asked forgiveness of the Jews for atrocities suffered during the Holocaust.

You might recall that Pope Francis has already celebrated a Jubilee Year. It was the extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy in 2013. He even opened a "Door of

Mercy" at a prison in Rome, signifying the purpose of the jubilee-to break down any barrier that keeps us from being with God and one another.

> Biblically, in Leviticus 25 and 27, we see the Jewish Law declaring every fiftieth year to be a Jubilee Year. During this time slaves would be emancipated, debts would be forgiven, and even the land would be allowed to rest. Numerically, a jubilee builds upon a sabbath rest of seven years. The Jubilee year is "seven Sabbaths of years," or seven times seven years.

As 2025 gets underway, I am pleased to announce a new offering at St. Charles-



This easy-to-use technology allows you to set up a secure account where your desired tithe is automatically debited from your bank account. No more worries about forgetting your envelope at home or scrambling to write a check during Mass.

How to Set Up Online Giving

- 1. Visit stcharleslima.org on your preferred web browser (Google, Internet Explorer, Firefox, etc.).
- 2. Click on the Give tab located at the top of the homepage.
- 3. Select the Create Account button (if you already have an account, simply log in). Don't forget to save your password for future use.
- 4. Once your account is created, you will see options for different ministries and events to donate to. Select the Offertory tab.
- 5. On the Offertory page, complete the following fields:
- 6. Gift Amount: Enter the amount you wish to donate.
- 7. Gift Type: Choose between a one-time donation or recurring donations (weekly, monthly, etc.).
- 8. Click Continue.
- 9. On the next screen, click Add Payment Method and choose to input either your credit card or banking account information.

Once all required fields are completed, click Add Payment Method. That's it! Your account is now set up for online giving.

Looking back on a year gives me the opportunity to share more about what I do in my job position. It also gives me a chance to give parishioners helpful tips relating to this position, such as where they can send bulletin announcements, our different media capabilities, ways we communicate with those inside and outside of the parish, and more!

As the Multimedia Specialist, my responsibilities include (but are not limited to!): gathering info for the bulletin and designing it, creating and publishing social media posts for our Facebook and Instagram pages, working with Diocesan, a print/web company, to modify our website content, creating printed materials such as flyers and cards, and updating the graphics on the outdoor digital sign. These responsibilities show the different ways we can communicate with the parish as well as the surrounding community and beyond. The parish utilizes print, social media, websites, and even video and photography in order to effectively reach out, keep people informed, and spread the Gospel.

In my first year here, I have been able to make note of some recurring questions. Hopefully, I can answer a few of those questions here. For example, the Sunday, January 12th bulletin is due by the Tuesday before, January 7th. Next, if you're looking to find the latest goings on at our parish through online sources, look no further than our social media pages, @St. Charles Borromeo Catholic Church -Lima on Facebook and @limastcharles on Instagram, respectively. The bulletin and the Chimes also have digital versions, found on our website at stcharleslima.org. Our website is also a great place to find a variety of helpful resources, including times & locations, Mass live streams, calendar events, online giving, sacramental info, and much more! You can also find a link to our school's webpage, sccslima.org. We are working with Diocesan to update some of our website's features and pages in the coming year, so that's something to look forward to as well!



Surviving the Holidays is a program from GriefShare. Participants view a movie in which survivors of loss of a loved one share their experiences of coping during the holidays. Table discussion followed, facilitated by Marilyn Askins, Chris Jones and Bert Vernon. Snacks were enjoyed. Participants were invited to share in the GriefShare Program to be offered in 2025. The session closed with prayer to Mary, the first tabernacle of the Eucharist!







2024 in Review and Looking Forward to 2025

As 2024 is ending and 2025 is about to start, I wanted to review what our middle school and high school youth did in the fall of 2024 and will do in the spring of 2025

Both groups began the semester in September and ran through November. In this first semester, the middle school youth program was "Unfolded." They were presented with the reality of God as the Creator, a Trinity of Divine Persons who exist in a communion of love, who created them as a pouring out of that love. They were shown that they are a part of God's plan of great love for humanity, who sent Jesus Christ as the ultimate sign of love, redeeming them from their sins and opening the way to heaven. "Unfolded", an origami-themed program, showed in its most basic sense, that paper folding transforms something ordinary into something beautiful and multi-dimensional. The art of folding is meditative and creative and provides a metaphor for the great love and care of the Creator when creating us. Through these

sessions, they were encouraged to view the teachings of the Church and examine them "fold by fold" until a concept was fully laid before them.

The Life Teen program was called Truth. This program started with an introduction to truth and then explored the topics of objective truth vs. moral relativism, creationism vs evolution, world religions and salvation, and ended with a look at the problem of evil.

In December, both groups took part in the USCCB training on Safe Environments and we ended the year on December 15th with a combined skating party at Edgewood Skate Arena.

The second semester began on January 5th, 2025. The middle school program is called "Direct Message." This program focuses on how the Ten Commandments are a great gift from God, but that we do not always see them that way. We are focusing on the beauty of the first three commandments as a response of love to God's call to a relationship with Him. This series uses the theme of messages, as our "reply" to God's invitation of love in loving out the commandments. Through worship, sacrifice, rest, and the celebration of the Mass, we reply to God's initial message with an enthusiastic "YES!" The practices of our faith aid us in loving God with our whole heart, mind, soul, and strength, and through a strong relationship with

Him, we can love our neighbor as ourselves.

The high school teens are focusing on the topic of mental health by covering spiritual vs mental health, peace, resilience, and hope. The topic of mental health is extremely important for teens and addressing this topic helps them to integrate their faith with all the daily challenges they face such as academic stress, social media pressures, family, and questions about who they are and their future. It is important to remember that Jesus ministered to the whole person, bringing healing and hope to those suffering and many teens suffer in silence. Addressing the topics of mental and spiritual health will give the teens practical tools that can support them spiritually and mentally.

In addition to the two youth groups, our 7th grade at our St. Charles school attended the Leadership Retreat at Damascus in October. The 6th grade will be attending the Faith and Science retreat and the 8th grade will be attending the Confirmation retreat, both in March.

Please continue to pray for our youth, our core team, and other volunteers.

The Final Coming, God's Promises, and Bambinelli Sunday

In November, both parents and children spent time on their arrival at the Finish Line, otherwise known as the Final Coming. All of the children created a visual aid so they could demonstrate Jesus' Ascension and his second coming. Children were reminded no one knows the date and time Jesus will come again and this is why we need to prepare every day so we will be worthy of Heaven. Each older child had to draw a card with a question about Heaven, Hell, and Purgatory. All children were encouraged to share what they knew and the catechist added and/or corrected as needed. Every child left with more information on each and ways they could insure being able to share in eternal life.

I began the parent's discussion with a new book, Christmas in Heaven by Anthony DeStefano available at Amazon and most Catholic book stores. The book is beautifully illustrated, written in charming rhyming verse, and includes the topic of purgatory which is often not included in any children's book. The story is about a little boy who is sad because his grandmother has passed away. His grandfather tells the boy he believes a party is taking place in Heaven with the arrival of his grandmother and he should continue to pray for his grandmother. The book includes many pictures of the saints incorporated into the story complete with a Saint Glossary. The strengthens the faith of all, young and old. A most uplifting story of loss for us all and a great addition to any Catholic family's library.

The parents then partially viewed a video on Formed web site, The Last Things. We then talked about the role of parents in helping guide their children on their journey to heaven. We discussed the importance of reconciliation, prayer, and looking at our lives to make sure we

are trying to reach holiness. I encourage the parents to think about the Final Coming and what we needed to do to prepare. No one benefits from putting death to the side as we will all experience it sometime and that is certain.

Our second November session the children, with the assistance of their parents wrote notes of gratitude to

Father Kent for Thanksgiving. The children worked very hard on this project. Everyone went together and purchased an insulated mug for him. Third grader, Knox Griffo, presented Father with the gift and the kids were so excited to see him receive his gift. Thanksgiving was the perfect time to let Father Kent know how much we appreciate him. Now he will never have to drink cold coffee again.

Our first session in December both parents and children focused on God's Promises. The children went through the familiar covenants with Noah, Abraham, Moses, and David. Discussion included the promises He made to Joseph, Mary, The Church, and You. The children described a broken promise and emphasized God's promises are never broken. The older children looked up the bible verses and read them together. Each covenant and promise were reviewed with pictures arranged in chronological order. All classes reviewed the Legend of the Candy Cane and some included the Candy Cane game.

Parent focus was on the twelve promises of the Sacred Heart of Jesus. We also covered some history of the Enthronement to the Sacred Heart. Parents were given information on St. Charles' *Welcome His Heart, Sacred Heart Enthronement Ministry*. They were provided contact information and walked away knowing what the enthronement entails. Next, I shared "Mary on the Mantel" book and Mary doll set. I purchased from the Catholic Co. but this can be purchased at most Catholic book stores. A perfect addition to anyone's Advent. A good option to that ornery Elf on a Shelf. Mary's doll has a pouch and a card with a task for the children to complete, which helps children prepare for the coming of Jesus. There are also ideas on where to place Mary and things she can do. I Love when we can incorporate our faith in a fun and useful way. We finished by practicing Lectio Divina using a children's style to help them incorporate it as an option of prayer in their homes.

Sunday, December 15th we are having our own Bambinelli Sunday. The children will make their Baby Jesus' out of clay. We have a home blessing to use that the head of the household in attendance will give. This could become a new tradition for families during Advent and

allows the children to become active participants. We are also having cake and punch as a birthday welcome for the Baby Jesus. We will finish up with some competitive Advent Bingo.

Candlemas - The Presentation of Jesus in the Temple


The Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, often called Candlemas, holds a special place in the Catholic liturgical calendar. Celebrated on February 2nd, this feast recalls when Mary and Joseph presented the infant Jesus in the Temple.

The story begins with Jewish customs concerning the birth of a firstborn son. According to the Mosaic Law, every firstborn male was to be consecrated to the Lord as a recognition of God's sovereignty and faithfulness (Exodus 13:2). Mary and Joseph brought Jesus to the Temple in Jerusalem forty days after His birth. In doing so, they fulfilled the law's requirements while revealing their humility and trust in God's plan. Yet, this moment of adherence to the law was far more than a simple act of obedience, it was a profound revelation of Jesus' divine identity and mission.

As they entered the Temple, Mary and Joseph encountered Simeon who had long awaited the Messiah. The Holy Spirit had assured Simeon that he would not die before seeing the Lord's anointed. When Simeon saw Jesus, he took the child in his arms and offered a prayer of praise now known as the Nunc Dimittis. "Lord, now you are letting your servant go in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel" (Luke 2:29-32). These words, inspired by the Spirit, articulate the dual mission of Christ as both the light for the Gentiles and the glory of Israel. In Simeon's declaration, we hear a message of hope extended to all of humanity.

Simeon's prophecy also carried a sobering note. He foretold that Jesus would be a sign of contradiction, destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel. Turning to Mary, he added that a sword would pierce her own soul (Luke 2:34-35). This poignant foreshadowing points to the suffering and sacrifice central to Christ's mission and

Mary's intimate participation in her Son's redemptive work. While the Presentation is a moment of hope and light, it also reminds us of the cost of salvation.



The name "Candlemas" reflects one of the feast's central symbols: light. During the liturgy, candles are blessed and carried in procession, symbolizing Christ as the light of the world. This ritual, rich in meaning, connects the faithful to the words of Jesus in the Gospel of John: "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life" (John 8:12). The lighting of candles becomes a powerful expression of faith, as the flickering flames represent not only the light of Christ but also the hopes and prayers of His followers.

In lighting candles, the faithful are reminded of Christ's promise to be with His people, illuminating their path through the darkness of sin and despair. The gentle glow of each flame serves as a communal act of faith, symbolizing the shared commitment to walk in His light and to be light-bearers to others. The lighting of candles during Candlemas unites the Church in its mission to reflect Christ's presence in a world often shadowed by confusion and moral ambiguity.

Simeon's recognition of Jesus as the Messiah is a profound moment of fulfillment, not only for Israel but for all nations. This is a feast that encourages believers to place their trust in God's promises and to see Christ as a beacon guiding them toward reconciliation with God. The timing of the feast itself underscores this message. As the days grow longer, the natural world mirrors the spiritual renewal that Candlemas represents, a movement from darkness to light, from despair to hope.

Candlemas is a feast that captures the heart of the Gospel. It draws us into the story of Christ's mission and invites us to embrace the transformative power of His light. As the Church celebrates this feast, it proclaims the enduring truth that Christ's light shines in the darkness, and the darkness cannot overcome it. Even in a world that often seems overshadowed by challenges, the message of Candlemas assures us that the light of Christ continues to burn brightly, offering direction and peace to all who trust in Him.



February 3 - Feast of St. Blaise

Every year on Feb. 3, the Church celebrates the feast of St. Blaise. Since he is the patron saint of those who suffer from throat ailments (and the doctors who treat them), many parishes around the world offer the "blessing of throats" in his honor.

A bishop and eventual martyr, Blaise of Sebaste began his spiritual journey as a hermit. He was a physician and known to be a miracle worker. He practiced the medicine of his time and is included in the group of the "14 holy helpers" of the Catholic Church—called that because they are considered effective intercessors against certain ailments of the body and soul.


UFLI Update: Reading, Spelling, and Writing Sentences!

By Lisa Mahler



Since August, our kindergarten students have been completing two lessons from the UFLI Manual each week to learn the basic consonant letters and the short vowel sounds. These letters and sounds are used to build words using our Alphabet boards. The

students use word chains to take simple words and change them into new words by moving, adding, deleting, or changing the vowel. These engaging activities allow the learners to use letter sounds to create new words.



The students also learn HEART Words. A heart word is a word that needs to be learned by heart as it is difficult to decode. Students learn to read it AND spell a list of 21 words for kindergarten. The students use these heart words to write sentences!

The students use what they have learned from the lesson to READ the DECODABLE TEXT. Reading independently is the key to confidence. They illustrate the text which demonstrates their comprehension.

The UFLI Approach has changed how we teach reading. The kids can read and spell words confidently! After the first 34 lessons, the students learn about the diagraphs, blends, and the many vowel combinations. These first lessons pave the way for advanced reading skills for First and Second grades.




