Dear Friends in Christ,


When were you last invited up on stage? When it comes to musicals, for me the invitation goes back 41 years. It was 1984 and I was a senior at Ottoville High School. Yes, after having spent four years in the orchestra pit and only "being heard," I wanted the opportunity to "be seen" on stage!

The move "upstairs" or should I say "upstage" came with a price. The musical that year was "Once Upon a Mattress," the 1959 Broadway show that made Carol Burnett famous. Based upon the fairy tale, "The Princess and the Pea," the show was set in medieval times.

Our high school sets were homemade but the costumes were ordered from a costume shop. Our measurements were taken and sent away. Then a few days before the show our costumes arrived.

At first it seemed as if there were important parts of the costume order missing-namely, pants for the gents! Then it was explained. Back in medieval times, men wore tights. Yikes! Now you know why I retreated back to the pit for another four decades after that one moment on stage! Yes, I am now more choosy about which roles I take!

Finally, this year, the perfect invitation accompanied by the perfect production appeared - *The Hunchback of Notre Dame*. I invite you to gather up your friends and join us at the civic center later this month. You

will travel to Paris in order to enjoy the Lima Central Catholic's musical production.

This year, the parish choirs and priests from our four Catholic parishes were invited to join the high school students on stage. Set in a cathedral, rather than a castle I think the costuming should be safe. Rather than tights, I suspect we will be decked out in appropriate choir dress. I have yet to see the costumes, but I have a "hunch" it will be either choir robes or cassock and surplice.

If you are not familiar, Victor Hugo wrote the novel, *The Hunchback of Notre Dame*, in the early 1800's on the heels of the French Revolution. This revolution not only brought down the monarchy in France but also suppressed the Church and mired the practice of the faith. In addition, it chipped away at much of the beautiful gothic architecture that had always inspired the faithful to look up to God and the heavens.

Hugo was fascinated by the Paris cathedral and was concerned about preserving it. His novel is set in 1482 – at a time when Europe has not yet even discovered that America exists.

In the shadow of the Cathedral of Notre Dame, amidst the slums of Paris, the Romani outcast (think gypsies!) recount the tragic love story that envelopes the crippled Quasimodo, the enchanting Esmeralda, the soldierly Phoebus and the conflicted Frollo.

Eternal questions are asked, "What makes a monster?" "What makes a man?" Answers are ringing from the bells of Notre Dame.

Even better, this past year we had the joy of seeing the resurrected Paris cathedral revealed to the world after the devastating fire five years ago. What was nearly lost for all time, has now been restored, polished, and represented to inspire our faith once again.

Over the years, several adaptations of the novel's timeless story emerged for both stage and screen. In the early 1900's several silent films were created. Plays, ballets, and musicals also took root. Eventually major film productions including even the 1996 animated feature were produced.

Our Catholic community here in Lima is so fortunate to have many gifted, creative forces join together with Lima Central Catholic High School to present this musical adaptation for the stage. I hope that you will support and enjoy the hard work that goes into presenting this timeless story for a new generation!

Lent: A Journey of Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving

Lent is more than just a season on the liturgical calendar; it's an invitation. A sacred call to step away from the noise of everyday life and enter into a deeper, more intentional relationship with God. It is a time for reflection, renewal, and realignment of the heart, a spiritual journey marked by three essential practices: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

These aren't just traditions or obligations; they are pathways, a God-given means of drawing closer to Him. Each one serves a unique role in helping us strip away distractions and refocus on what truly matters. But how can we engage in these practices in a way that leads to real transformation?

If Lent is a journey, then prayer is the map. It is the lifeline that keeps us connected to God, the direct channel through which we hear His voice and make our hearts known to Him. Yet, too often, prayer becomes routine, something we check off a list rather than a living, breathing conversation with our Creator.

During Lent, we are invited to pray more deeply, more intentionally, and more persistently. This means moving beyond the hurried Our Fathers, Hail Marys, and mealtime blessings to embrace true dialogue with God. As Pope Francis reminds us, "*Prayer is the strength of the Christian and of every person who believes*." It is through prayer that we find the grace to face life's struggles, the wisdom to discern God's will, and the peace that surpasses understanding.

There isn't just one "right" way to pray, but Lent is the perfect time to expand your approach and deepen your relationship with God. Start with personal reflection: set aside quiet time to meditate on Scripture and let God's Word speak to your heart. Prayer isn't just about speaking; it's also about listening. Then, step into communal worship. Attend Mass more frequently, walk the path of Christ through the Stations of the Cross, or join aLentenprayer group. Faith is meant to be lived in community, and these practices help anchor you in the body of Christ. Finally, don't forget intercessory prayer. Lift up those in need, both near and far, trusting in God's mercy to work in their lives. When we pray for others, we not only bring their needs before the Lord but also soften our own hearts to His will. This Lent, challenge yourself to pray in new ways, because when you seek God earnestly, He always draws you closer.

As we commit to deeper prayer, we begin to see its ripple effect; transforming not just our relationship with God, but also our relationships with others.

If prayer draws us closer to God, fasting removes what stands in the way. In our modern world, fasting is often reduced to a personal challenge, an exercise in willpower. But true fasting goes far deeper. It is a spiritual discipline, a way of emptying ourselves so God can fill us. Pope Benedict XVI once said, "Fasting expresses sorrow for a serious misfortune, but also the intention of taking a certain responsibility by confessing our sins and being resolved to turn our hearts and actions to greater justice toward God and neighbor." Think about that for a moment. Fasting isn't just about giving up chocolate or skipping a meal; it's about detoxifying the soul, removing distractions so we can hunger for God rather than the temporary comforts of the world.

This Lent, consider fasting in a way that truly challenges you, not just by giving up the usual comforts, but by transforming the way you think, speak, and live. Start by fasting from negativity. Let go of gossip, criticism, and complaining, and replace them with gratitude. Instead of tearing down, build up. Instead of dwelling on what's wrong, focus on what's good. Next, fast from digital noise. Cut down on screen time and create space for silence and contemplation. How often do we scroll mindlessly, filling every quiet moment with distractions? Use that time instead to pray, reflect, or simply be still in God's presence. Finally, fast from excess. Whether it's food, shopping, or entertainment, challenge yourself to embrace self-discipline. Let your sacrifice remind you that true fulfillment doesn't come from material things but from a heart aligned with God. And as you let go of the unnecessary, use that space to practice generosity, giving more of your time, attention,

and resources to those in need. Fasting isn't just about what you give up; it's about what you gain, a heart that is more free, more focused, and more open to God's grace. The goal of fasting is not deprivation but freedom, freedom to desire God above all else.

Finally, almsgiving. If prayer connects us to God and fasting clears the way, almsgiving is what puts faith into action. It is love made visible, a tangible expression of Christ's call to serve the least among us.

Pope John Paul II emphasized that the Lenten practices of fasting and almsgiving... have an important social and community function. Lent is not just about personal transformation; it is about transforming the world around us.

Almsgiving doesn't have to be grand to be meaningful. Sometimes, the smallest acts of generosity, done with great love, make the biggest difference. Start by giving financially, not just out of obligation, but as a way to bless others. Support a charity, contribute to a local parish project, or quietly help someone in your



community who is struggling. If money is tight, give something just as or more valuable, your time. Volunteer at a shelter, visit the sick or elderly, or simply be present for someone who needs a listening ear. In a world that moves fast, offering your time can be one of the most powerful gifts. But true almsgiving isn't just about what you give externally; it's about what you give from the heart. Forgive someone who has wronged you. Offer encouragement to someone who is struggling. Choose kindness, even when it's difficult. When we give with love, whether through our resources, our presence, or our compassion, we reflect the very heart of Jesus. Isn't that what Lent is all about?

Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving are not isolated practices; they work together, each strengthening the other. Prayer fuels fasting, fasting heightens our awareness of others' needs, and almsgiving is the natural outpouring of a heart transformed by both.

So how do we put all of this into practice? It starts with small, intentional steps. First, set a prayer schedule. Whether it's praying a daily Rosary, spending time in Eucharistic Adoration, or simply carving out a few moments of silence, commit to making prayer a consistent part of your day. Prayer isn't about fitting God into your schedule, it's about building your schedule around Him. Next, choose a meaningful fast. Don't just give up something easy; challenge yourself. Let your sacrifice be a daily reminder to redirect your heart toward God. Finally, make almsgiving personal. Instead of just checking a box, look for a way to give that truly impacts someone's life. Maybe it's helping a struggling neighbor, writing a note of encouragement, or offering your time to someone who feels alone. Lent isn't just about discipline, it's about transformation. And when you approach it with purpose, you'll find that the sacrifices you make don't just change your habits; they change your heart.

Lent is not just a time to *give up*, it is a time to *take up* the challenge of growing in holiness. By embracing these three pillars with intention and purpose, we prepare our hearts not only for Easter but for a deeper, more fulfilling walk with Christ. The journey begins now. How will you take your first step?



Every year, FOCUS (Fellowship of Catholic University Students) hosts its annual national conference from January 1st to January 5th. For the last two years St. Charles has been blessed to send a group of young adults to attend this conference. In our parish, we are fortunate to welcome college students from multiple universities including University of Northwestern Ohio, The Ohio State University (Lima branch), Rhodes State College, and Ohio Northern University. Even better, these students stem from all over the country, from the state of Washington, to New Hampshire, to the local surrounding counties, it is a true representation of our country!

This year, 9 of those young adults plus Father Kent were blessed to attend the SEEK 2025 conference.

We owe our tremendous thanks to the generosity of St. Charles parish and the Serra Club who funded our board and airfare - a cost that would have kept many young adults from attending. In thanks to our donors, we shared a reflection of three questions in regard to our experience of the SEEK conference. These questions were: How was SEEK a gift to you? What was the most outstanding part of SEEK to you? How do you feel more equipped to live your faith after attending SEEK? To give you an idea of the impact of this conference, I will

share the group's answers to the third question here.

How do you feel more equipped to live your faith after attending SEEK?

"I feel absolutely more equipped to live out my faith after SEEK. Going to adoration and confession meant a lot to me. Saying the rosary daily is something I have kept up with doing, being solid in the grounds of why I am Catholic, and just being able to have gratitude for everything God has given me. SEEK was honestly the best week of my life. It was the best way to start the year surrounded by my good friends and all sharing the faith and fun moments - something I hope to do more often."

"I feel more equipped to live my faith after SEEK by hearing the testimonies of others who have shared the Gospel and how the Good News of Jesus Christ speaks for itself - you just have to be willing to step out in faith and share Jesus with others."

"I am more confident to speak of the faith, specifically to those around me who are not practicing or are lukewarm in faith."

"After having Mass every day and listening to some of the most amazing Catholic speakers around, I think it's safe to say God gave me exactly what I needed to inspire and motivate me. As a result, I feel more equipped to live my faith and work on sharing it with others back home."

"I feel more equipped to live my faith by joy in sharing testimony with complete strangers and the hope that comes from continuing the flame of restoring one unified body of all who love Christ. This was particularly true when we toured Temple Square (after having completed

the conference) where one of the Morman missionaries asked us to share testimony - she was so taken aback by Catholics who knew and loved their faith - something she had never seen before."

"I feel reassured in the all-encompassing love our Father gives us. Through several of the speakers at SEEK, I felt comforted knowing that God does not forget about you, does not abandon you, and you have access to Him at all times. After attending SEEK, I find myself running to Him when problems come up or something is worrying me. He is the ultimate protector and comforter in our lives.'

"With questions answered, and connecting back with God and having a group of friends who are believers, all help me be more equipped to live my faith. I have seen a change already in myself, with SEEK and a group of faithful friends having been a big part of why.'

"SEEK reinforced many things for me. The breakout



session titled, "Mary at the Crossroads in History," reinforced the power of the rosary and Mary being all of our Mother."

"After being at SEEK this year, I believe that I now have a greater appreciation for how important living your faith to fullest every day is, and how to make time for little moments with God. We never know how much time we have and He will always be there for us when we need Him most."

It is incredible how unifying and

strengthening it is for a group to attend such a conference as a community. Our faith is made to be lived out in the support of a loving community, and our group certainly received this experience as well in our week together.

If you haven't attended a conference or retreat in while, let this be your invitation to "seek" one out! If possible, I encourage you to even attend one with our community here - whether it be the parish men's retreat in March this year, or the women's retreat later in fall, or maybe a Damascus men's or women's retreat - pursue opportunities that equip you to live out your faith!

St. Charles plans to send another group to next year's SEEK conference which always occurs January 1-5. If you are interested in supporting this group financially, please reach out to the parish office! If you are interested in supporting FOCUS as an organization, I encourage you to do so by directly supporting one of their missionaries (all of whom must fundraise their fulltime salaries), my twin sister, Elena Niese being one of them! As with all things, the most powerful support is prayer. Please keep our young adults who attended this conference in prayer. Especially that they may have the courage and grace to respond with an open heart to the path the Lord is setting before them, that they may have the resources needed to respond, and the loving support to help them follow-through. God bless you as we walk the Lenten journey and prepare to celebrate Easter!

The Sacrament of Marriage was covered in the classroom and with the parents. The older children read Mark 2:19 and Ephesians 5:24 and discussed how a man and a woman freely say yes to loving and caring for each other for their entire lives. The scripture teaches us that Jesus is the bridegroom and the Church is His bride. He has joined Himself to His bride, the Church, forever and never stops caring for her. They compared Christ's love to married love. All of the children covered The Fourth Commandment: Honor your Mother and Father. They took a deeper look into how each of them can honor their parents. The younger students also took a look at how God's love is everywhere including the love man and woman share with each other in a marriage.

All parents left with a copy of the Marriage Requirements in the Catholic Church. Barry McCollough spoke to the parents on marriage: how the parents and the family depend on God's love to help them to continue to grow closer as a family and to God. Barry began with a bit of mind reading which everyone really enjoyed.



Marriage and Home Blessings

The children learned about the Epiphany Home Blessing. Classes wrote out the writing that goes above the main door of their homes which is: 20+C+M+B+25. This writing is done in chalk, and written by parents or a priest. The letters C, M, and B can stand for the traditional names of the Wise Men (Magi), Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. These letters are also the first letters of the Latin blessing: "*Chistus mansionem benedicat*", which means "**May Christ Bless this House**". Every family was sent home with their own Epiphany Home Blessing Kit, which included: a bottle of Holy Water, St. Benedict Medal, map of the possible route the Wise Men (Magi) followed to reach the baby Jesus. Father Kent made sure the chalk and St. Benedict medals were blessed.

In our January Family Session, the children and parents were allowed to touch the Gold, Frankincense, and Myrrh. We talked about why each was a perfect gift for Jesus.

Gold: A medal that has always been valued, and most members of royalty had Gold. Melchior, the King of Arabia, new Baby Jesus was a King.

Frankincense: A light colored plant resin that creates an aroma when burned. The smoke reminded them of the mystery of God and its smoke forms a spiritual link between heaven and earth.

Myrrh: A dark colored plant resin, most commonly used as a burial ointment for embalming. This foretells Christ's death. A reminder he was born to be our King and our salvation.
