Dear Friends in Christ,

The year 2028 will mark a significant milestone in the life of St. Charles Borromeo Parish. It will mark our Diamond Jubilee—a time to celebrate our 75th year as a parish.

Yes, it was the summer of 1953 when Bishop George Rehring assigned Fr. Walter Hanley to organize a fourth parish for the city of Lima. A Canonical Decree of October 20, 1953, drew the boundary lines forming a territory that used the

Pennsylvania Railroad as its north boundary, Cole Street for the East, Auglaize County for the South, and Kemp Road for the western boundary.

The original parish was comprised of 250 families drawn from the other three parishes in Lima–180 from St. Rose, 50 from St. John, and 20 from St. Gerard. By August 15, 1954, ground was broken from a combination

school/church and it opened to 293 students for the 1955-56 school year-complete with four Sisters of


Charity leading the faculty. By August 23, 1964, the first (and current) church was dedicated. This highlighted an extraordinarily fast and amazing growth at the intersection of Cable Road and Elm Street!

Now is the time to begin our planning for Jubilee 2028. To that end I have sent out letters of

invitation to parishioners who have served on our leadership councils and commissions these past several years. I also welcome others who perhaps are new to our parish or who now have the time to offer to be a part of this special planning opportunity. Just

let me know if you would like to offer your help. We intend to begin our work in January, after the holidays.

When I was newly ordained in 1993, my first assignment was to St. John the Baptist Parish in Toledo. It was located in a neighborhood along the Michigan border known as "Point Place." My first year coincided with the celebration of our Diamond Jubilee, having been founded in 1918 by a neighboring

parish to the south, St. Michael. I still recall fondly the celebrations we enjoyed that year.

Naturally, part of our planning for St. Charles will envision the special celebrations throughout the Jubilee Year. However, we also want to determine how to build and nurture our parish in preparation for the jubilee as well as beyond it. We will develop a new Priority Plan to help St. Charles write the next chapter in the life of our parish.

As we approach the end of the year, with the special holiday and Holy Days, I hope that you will keep this important work in your prayer and let me know if the Holy Spirit is prompting you to offer your help in planning for our future.

As we enter the holy season of Advent, our hearts are drawn to the spirit of giving, hope, and renewal that prepares us for the coming of Christ. We recently received approval from the Diocese and Diocesan Building Commission to proceed with our Living Christ elevator project. If all goes as projected, we anticipate breaking ground in 2026. That timeframe remains an estimate, because the elevator is built offsite and may take 9-12 months to complete. However, each step brings us closer to making our parish fully accessible to all who come to pray, celebrate, and gather here.

As we look to the future, we are seeking new and established parishioners to share their gifts through leadership and service. We welcome individuals of any age who bring professional expertise, energy, and commitment, but above all, we invite those called to demonstrate Christian stewardship, spiritual maturity, and integrity in their personal and professional lives. If you are interested in serving, we invite you to prayerfully consider one of the following opportunities:

Finance Council – Meets monthly, typically on the third Wednesday from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Members provide insight and guidance on parish financial planning and stewardship. Professional experience in finance, accounting, banking, law, or administration is especially helpful.

Pastoral Council – Works directly with Fr. Kent to help shape the vision and direction of parish life. Members provide input on pastoral priorities and help ensure our ministries reflect the needs and spirit of our parish community.

Money Counters – Meets once a week at 8:30 a.m. Friendly team environment. We need people who are comfortable counting money – basic accounting skills are a plus. This essential ministry supports the day-to-day operations of our parish and fosters fellowship among volunteers.

Development Committee- Meets periodically to assist the Business Office. Focuses on developing and executing strategies to secure financial resources for the parish's long-term needs. Fundraising efforts are generally directed toward funding capital projects, ministry expansions, or other long-term goals outlined by the parish's mission.

Endowment committee- Meets quarterly and is responsible for managing the parish's long-term financial fund. Their main purpose is to ensure the parish's financial stability and provide a permanent, reliable source of income for its mission and ministries, even during economic downturns.

We rely on the continued efforts of our parishioners to strengthen our church community and facilitate the mission of St. Charles. Each act of service, no matter how small, makes a difference in helping our parish stay healthy and thrive. Let us open our hearts and respond to God's call with the words: "Send me, Lord."

If you are looking for a meaningful way to share your time, skills, and faith, we would love to have you join one of these ministries. Your involvement strengthens the mission and vitality of St. Charles Borromeo, helping us remain a parish that is both faithful to its traditions and forward-looking in service.

It has now been about seven months since I arrived here in Lima and was appointed as Associate Pastor at St. Charles Parish. Every day since, I have made it a personal mission to connect with our Haitian brothers and sisters, while also learning from each parishioner and discovering the welcoming culture of the people of Ohio who have so graciously opened their hearts to us.

Through my ministry and daily presence, many faithful have been inspired to renew their Catholic faith, especially during the Sunday 3:00 p.m. Mass. Several parents have requested baptism for their children, and with great joy, a number of adults have also asked to be baptized—what the Church calls *catechumens*. Each of these stories of faith continues to inspire me deeply.

Every weekend after Mass, I find great joy in meeting some of our youth at Collett Street Park, where we talk, share experiences, and play soccer together. From time to time, I also visit and thank our local partners—*Connecting Borders, St. Vincent de Paul, Christian Corner,* and the *Lima Public Library, etc.*—for the support and assistance they offer to all, especially to our Haitian community members who come seeking help.

In this same spirit of collaboration and fraternity, I often visit our brothers and sisters at the Church of the Nazarene, under the leadership of Pastor Franck. I remain available and open to everyone in the community, following the noble motto of our homeland, Haiti: "L'union fait la force" — Unity is our strength. It is with this same conviction that I also traveled to Findlay to meet members of the Haitian community there and offer my pastoral service.

A particularly moving and joyful moment for us took place on **September 28**, during the *Day of Prayer for Migrants and Refugees* organized by St. Charles Parish. On that day, we blessed and installed in the church a beautiful icon of **Our Lady of Perpetual Help**, patroness of Haiti, graciously offered by **Sister Magdala from the Sylvania Franciscans**. Sister Magdala carries with her wonderful memories from her years of mission in Haiti. That evening was truly vibrant—with many colors, delicious food from different countries, and joyful musical animation that brought warmth to everyone's heart.

On this occasion, I, Fr. Bertholy CHERUBIN, Spsj, Associate pastor and founder-accompanist of the Haitian community, shared with all present a moving prayer I personally composed, dedicated to Our Lady of Perpetual Help. The prayer, which came from the depths of my heart as a pastor walking with the people

of migration, emphasized hope, the journey of migration, and the abiding presence of Mary who walks with her children—even far from home.

"Our Lady of Perpetual Help, you who always hear the cry of our hearts, never abandon your children who are searching for life. Walk with us still—through lonely streets, on roads of pain and transition— and be our light in the midst of darkness..." (Prayer composed by Fr. BC)

It reminds us that our courage and strength do not come from our own abilities, but from the grace of God who acts powerfully in those who open their hearts to Him.

Together with **St. Charles Borromeo**, let us recommit ourselves to live our faith with courage, to be light and salt in our world, and to continue building the Church and our communities on the foundations of **justice**, **love**, **and hope**.

In that same spirit of faith and unity, the Haitian Catholic Community warmly invites everyone to join us in this joyful celebration of our patron, **St. Charles Borromeo**—protector of the sick and of all who seek spiritual growth.

O St. Charles Borromeo, faithful shepherd and defender of the Church, friend of the poor and the sick, we place ourselves under your protection. Ask Jesus to grant us strength in our weakness, joy in our service, and sincerity in our love for God and for one another. Amen.

With gratitude to all who continue to support, pray for, and walk with our Haitian Catholic community—may God bless you abundantly. Let us continue to move, from beginning to beginning, guided by faith, love, and hope.

From Attendance to Encounter: **Guiding a New Generation of Disciples**

For many years, it seemed that younger generations were walking away from the Church, especially Millennials and Gen Z. Yet new research from the Barna Group, in partnership with Gloo's State of the Church initiative, tells a much more hopeful story. It seems that these very generations are now quietly leading a return to church life.

A Surprising Shift

According to Barna's findings, Millennials and Gen Z are attending church more often than before, and more frequently than older generations. On average, Gen Z churchgoers attend about 1.9 weekends per month, while Millennials attend around 1.8 times per month. These are nearly double what they were five years ago.

Signs of Spiritual Renewal

Researchers believe this change may point to a renewed openness to faith among younger generations. "The fact that young people are showing up more frequently than before is not typical," says Barna's Vice President of Research, Daniel Copeland. "It's good news for church leaders."

David Kinnaman, Barna's CEO, adds, "The influx of new generations represents a massive opportunity for congregational leaders, but this re-

newed interest must be stewarded well." In other words, more people may be coming back to church, but attendance is just the beginning. The deeper call is to turn that renewed participation into lasting dis-

Kinnaman cautions, "Our research clearly shows that churchgoing alone does not in itself create devoted disciples. Even with the increasing participation of younger generations, there is still the challenge of shaping hearts and minds to live out their faith beyond church participation."

This insight echoes a challenge the Church has recognized for decades. As the Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy noted, "There is a further problem: it is the faith itself. The liturgy by its nature normally presupposes a minimum of biblical culture and a fairly solid commitment of living faith. Often enough these conditions are not present. The assembly or many of its members are still in need of evangelization. The liturgy, which is not meant to be a tool of evangelization, is forced into a missionary role."

In short, increased attendance is an encouraging sign, but the true work of renewal lies in forming disciples who understand, live and love the faith they profess.

What This Means for Parish Life

This growing engagement among younger adults presents both a gift and a challenge for par-

ishes. The Gift: Young adults are seeking community, purpose, and truth. They are responding to churches that offer authentic relationships, spiritual mentoring, and a sense of belonging. This presents an extraordinary opportunity to help them grow in faith and mission. The Challenge: Parishes must not only welcome this return but also cultivate depth of faith. Attending Mass is vital, but so too is forming the mind and heart to live the Gospel beyond Sunday. Faith formation, Scripture study, and spiritual mentorship can bridge the gap between participation and transformation.

Ultimately, the goal is not only to bring people back to the pews, but to help them encounter Christ in a personal and transformative way.


A Hopeful Future

If these trends continue, this renewed spiritual curiosity among Millennials and Gen Z could reshape the future of the Church. It reminds us that God is still at work in the hearts of the next genera-

Perhaps this is how renewal begins, not in sudden crowds or emotional revivals, but in quiet returnings. A generation once thought to be drifting is finding its way home, one weekend at a time.

May we, as a Church, welcome them with joy, nurture their faith with care, and walk with them as they rediscover the beauty of following Christ together.

The Advent Wreath



Traditionally, Advent wreaths are constructed of a circle of evergreen branches into which four candles are inserted, representing the four weeks of Advent. Ideally, three candles are purple, and one is rose, but white candles can also be used.

The purple candles symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and goods works undertaken at this time. The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete Sunday, when the priest also wears rose vestments at Mass; Gaudete Sunday is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over, and they are close to Christmas.

The progressive lighting of the candles symbolizes the expectation and hope surrounding our Lord's first coming into the world and the anticipation of his second coming to judge the living and the dead.

Living the Good News of Jesus Christ

How can we live the Good News of Jesus Christ in our daily lives? This year in Family Formation, we are focusing on the 'Foundations' of our faith, which includes exploring this question. For the months of October and November, we've discussed topics such as "The Mission of Our Family" and "Jesus: My Friend and Savior." Woven throughout these foundational lessons is the call to grow deeper in encounter with Jesus, and to ultimately share his story and love with others. The 'Foundations' program is specifically centered on the Kerygma, which is Greek for 'proclamation' and refers to the essential proclamation of the Good News of Jesus Christ. 'Foundations' offers seven pieces of Scripture telling the basic story of Christ's saving work of salvation on our behalf:

- *God loves you and has a plan for your life. (1 John 3:1)
- *Sin separates us from God. (Romans 3:23)
- *Jesus Christ died to save you. (John 3:16)
- *Repent and believe in the Gospel. (*Acts* 3:19)
- *Be baptized and receive the Holy Spirit. (Acts 2:38)
- *Follow Jesus, and His body, the Church. (*John 15:4-5*)
- *Go, make disciples. (Matthew 5:15-16)

The Family Formation program references Pope Francis's document Evangelii Gaudium as inspiration: "On the lips of the catechist the first proclamation must ring out over and over: 'Jesus Christ loves you; he gave his life to save you; and now he is living at your side every day to enlighten, strengthen and free you.' This first proclamation is called 'first' not because it exists at the beginning and can then be forgotten or replaced by other more important things... It is the principal proclamation, the one which we must hear again and again in different ways, the one which we must announce one way or another throughout the process of catechesis, at every level and moment" (Evangelii Gaudium, 164). This is what 'Foundations' strives to accomplish in its application; the continual proclamation of God's love for us at every level, from kindergartners to parents.

This foundational message hasn't just appeared in Family Formation; it's a term I've seen again and again in several ministries. During the month of September, I had the great privilege of attending the Live Jesus Ministries training for the new Spiritual Mentorship and Small Group Discipleship initiative here at St. Charles. We learned great information, mostly about the current youth culture and how to meet Gen Z and Gen Alpha where they are spiritually and mentally, while also being a positive living witness to the transformative

power of Jesus Christ. We discussed sharing the *Kerygma*, as well as how to apply it to a small group setting. We practiced sharing our testimonies in two minutes or less, focusing on:

Before - What was happening in your life before your encounter with Jesus? Encounter - Share the encounter you had with God, rooted in the Kerygma. After - How has this encounter changed your life? How are you growing in faith through His Church?

Once again, I encountered the term Kervgma at the Diocesan Pastoral Conference breakout session titled "How to Use Your Story in Ministry." The speaker, Pete Burak (Vice President of Renewal Ministries), built upon what I learned during the Live Jesus Ministries training on sharing testimonies. He suggested tips such as discovering different ways to share our stories according to what the situation calls for, practicing sharing it, and focusing on the heart of our story rather than every minute detail. However, the two tips that struck me were always asking the Holy Spirit to be completely present and involved in my interactions with others, as well as inviting the person I'm sharing with to respond by asking a simple question such as "What do you think about that?" While these tips may seem simple, they're often forgotten in the moment and we can tend to over-complicate or over-explain our faith to others.

All things considered, let us strive to keep the simple, beautiful proclamation of the Gospel at the forefront of our minds as we share the experience of our rich Catholic faith and our encounters with the living God with others, and as we learn how deep his love for us truly is. This begins with fostering our relationship with him. Visit

him in Adoration, visit him in prayer, visit him in your heart. One of my favorite paintings is Jesus, the Light of the World by William Holman Hunt. In it, Jesus "stands at the door and knocks," holding a lantern amidst a dark evening. The door has no outside handle; it can only be opened from the inside. Before sharing our encounters with the world around us, let us allow Christ to shine his light into



our hearts and encounter his love in a new, fresh way. Begin again with him. Trust him. God loves you and invites you to love him in return.

On Sunday October 7, 2025 we welcomed a new group of Catechumens (those who have been baptized) and Candidates (those who are not yet baptized either Catholic or in another faith) during our Rite of Welcoming/Rite of Entrance Mass.

Blessing of the pets

We celebrated the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi on Saturday October 4th with our own Blessing of Pets. We had a nice turnout, and the weather was beautiful. Our pets and pet owners were happy to meet each other, and we are happy to report that the day went off without any incidents! We hope to continue this tradition each year.

Christian Corner continues serving free lunches every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at an average of 41/day.

Our Wednesday Food Pantry distribution, consisting of fresh fruits, vegetables, lunch meat and some ready-made items, continues to be well-attended. The West Ohio Food Bank delivery

arrives at 7:00 a.m. and a team of ten plus community volunteers helps unload the truck and place items on the tables.

We were blessed to have two volunteers from the Local UAW retiree group build and install a railing for the 3 steps up to the entry. Many of our clients are elderly and this provides much-needed stabilization. We also have a ramp available for those who prefer that method.

The Ohio Northern University Health Van is in our parking lot the first Wednesday of every month. Immunizations, flu shots and Covid boosters are always available. A Resident Physician is available for consultation and treatment on this mobile health van. Also, a Senior level Pharm. D. student is on board for medication review.

This year we begin our third year of celebrating a series of Holy Hours as a parish. The theme for this year's Holy Hours is "Out of darkness, into light." The theme originated in my own spiritual life back in 2023. Before receiving my current position with St. Charles, I was working in the medical field while working part-time in church music ministry. I was frequently questioned, criticized, and tempted to leave my faith behind while at work. Since then, the workplace atmosphere has not necessarily improved for many people as our daily lives become a mission field.

This is not a reason for us to be discouraged! Christ has said, "You are the salt of the earth... You are the light of the world." (Matthew 5:13-14). You. How is it possible to be salt and light in an age of great darkness? Isn't this an impossible task? Monsignor James Shea, president of the University of Mary, spoke at our annual Diocesan Pastoral Conference and described our modern experience. He explained how we have transitioned from an age of Christendom (when the society as a whole promotes and supports Christian values) to an apostolic age (when Christian values are not

generally accepted by society). This change in societal dynamics majorly affects our daily lives as Christians.

I am thankful that in my personal experience, the Holy Spirit has provided the conviction and words necessary to defend, uphold, debate, and even converse through some of the most challenging, peace-threatening temptations to my faith. Although I knew God's presence, that didn't mean I wasn't frequently distressed, disheartened, and longing for prayerful support. There is a prayer I say each time I receive communion. It goes, "Lord, I believe I have received your body, your blood, your soul, and your divinity. I believe it because you have said it, and I am ready to give my life to maintain this truth. Fill me with the courage, grace, and strength necessary to do so in any and every way that you may call me to." This prayer has been pivotal to my own testimony, and I continue to refer to it in my hunger for grace each day.

Take heart knowing that you weren't made to rely on yourself. A God-given mission demands God-given grace! This year's series of Holy Hours is intended to be a fount of grace for all members of St. Charles striving to be salt and light and searching for the grace to make that possible. Each Holy Hour focuses on prayer for a particular field encountering darkness in our age. The September Holy Hour was joined with the celebration of the World Day of

Migrants and Refugees to pray for all migrants and refugees. The next Holy Hour will be on November 23rd - the Feast of the Christ the King of the Universe. We will offer special prayer for all those in legal and political fields. On January 25th we will offer a Holy Hour during Catholic Schools Week where we will pray especially for all those working in education. Finally, we will offer a final Holy Hour on April 12th, Divine Mercy Sunday, for all those working in health care.

We all have our God-given missions in a time and age such as this. I pray that you may not delay the radical good that God desires to work through you. I pray that you may trust in him, and your ability to cooperate with his grace. I pray that you may believe in the power of your mission, no matter how big or small it may seem. As a minister to this parish, I carry deeply my responsibility to help pave the way to the strength, courage, and grace that you need to live the life of abundance that Christ came to provide for you (John 10:10). Ultimately, it is my prayer that this year's series of Holy Hours will be a fount of grace for all members of St. Charles living your daily calling to be salt and light in our apostolic age. "For he says: 'In an acceptable time I heard you, and on the day of salvation I helped you.' Behold, now is a very acceptable time; behold, now is the day of salvation," (2 Corinthians 6:2).

It has been a good and busy past couple months for me, and now that we're getting into the holiday season, it will be even more so! One of the many good things that happened in the past couple months was the 2025 Diocesan Pastoral Conference. Members of our Pastoral Ministry Team attended the conference on September 23rd. It was a great way to unite as a Parish Team and as a whole Diocese. The theme was: Set Apart - Pastoral Strategies to Form Holy Disciples in a Post-Christian World, and the main speaker was Monsignor James Shea.

This issue of the Chimes has other articles talking about the key takeaways of the conference, so I thought I'd just share some of the things from the conference that stood out to me personally. I thought some of these things were good to think about as both a parish and as individual parishioners.

The main takeaways for me came in our afternoon session, when Msgr. James Shea talked about some of the chief temptations of living in an apostolic age, or a society where Christianity is no longer the common way of thinking and we must evangelize the way the apostles did. There were three main temptations he pointed out.

The first was that we can tend to divide the world into good and bad people. The truth is only God can judge others. Instead of completely condemning the sinner, we should condemn the sin, and love the sinner.

The second temptation was that we think we can use the weapons of the world and the enemy to our advantage. However, we are called to be in the world but not of it. When we set ourselves apart from the world, people then have the opportunity to ask why we live differently.

The third temptation is that we can allow ourselves to be Utopians which is what the current secular mindset seems to be. Utopians believe that through human advancements alone, we can create a perfect society. This takes God out of the picture and fails to take into account the doctrine of original sin. Sadly, the Church can sometimes take on the wounds of our time. The good news is that it always battles these wounds and by doing so, ultimately develops the immunity.

In parish media news, we recently had a vital volunteer, Justin Aab, suddenly pass away a couple months back. He played a pivotal role in helping set up and maintain many of our different areas of tech, from giving advice about computers in the parish office, to checking and running the sound system, cameras, and audio/visual computer desk in the church. This included the livestream that is used to stream the Mass to our Facebook, Youtube, and website pages, a resource many of our parishioners rely on when homebound or in similar circumstances.

As a result, we are in need of more help with this ministry. The livestream is recorded at the 10:30 a.m. Mass. Volunteers use the AV desk computers, located in the church, and record the Mass with the help of computer programs that are connected to a couple video cameras.

The training for this is fairly simple to learn and there are helpful notes located at the desk for volunteers to reference. 
