## Off the Streets

Dear Friends in Christ,

Just as things are winding down for this academic year, new things are sprouting up here at St. Charles! Yes, summertime is not necessarily one long vacation. Summer can be a great time for new opportunities, new friendships, and even new ministries.

This summer, we are pleased to welcome Alex Wahl, a seminarian for the Diocese of Toledo. Alex will be here primarily for the months of June and July. I have had the pleasure of being acquainted with him for the past couple years. I know that he is very excited to be with us here in Lima.

Alex has written a little bit about himself so that you can have a head start in getting to know him. In the first part of May, he is finishing his courses for the semester at the seminary in Cincinnati and then will have some time to spend with family and friends before moving to Lima at the very end of May.

The other new opportunity is the hope that Lima can begin to offer a new ministry called **Off the Streets**. This is a relatively new ministry that was founded by a Roman Catholic deacon in Connecticut in 2009. It has spread through a few states and arrived in our diocese just



a couple of years ago through the effort of Maumee St. Joseph Parish and their local Knights of Columbus Council.

Off the Streets provides hope and dignity to those experiencing homelessness by helping them transition to permanent housing. OTS assists people referred by local social service providers with a security deposit and basic furnishings. OTS performs these tasks using only volunteers and donations. No government funding is accepted.

Since its founding, OTS has helped 12,000 people move into their own home. In just the last couple of years, 1,200 of those were in the Toledo area. In just the past two months, Findlay has added four persons (two households) to the 12,000.

How exactly does it work? It's easy as 1-2-3 with this unique ministry:

1. Provide dignity, encouragement, and support to those experiencing homelessness by helping them transition to permanent housing.
2. Collect furniture and household goods to deliver to neighbors moving into an apartment or home using volunteers exclusively.
3. Accept referrals from other agencies for those who have found housing and have the means to be

sustainable. OTS may also provide a security deposit directly to the landlords, often a barrier to obtaining housing.

Off the Streets is the only non-profit in our diocese that makes whole-house deliveries of goods to those in need, transforming empty space into a home.

In early April, I had the joy of meeting with representatives from both Maumee and Findlay to learn how they were able to get this beautiful ministry off the ground. First, I was edified by their passion for and love of the ministry. They were quick to say that this ministry has touched their hearts and lives in profound ways as much, if not more than, the families they are assisting.

The veterans also emphasized that this ministry is super-focused in their approach to helping. They only carry out the three steps listed above. They do not determine which families to assist. Rather, they partner with local agencies to know which families are ready for this important step in life.

Finally, I was happy to see that this ministry not only comes focused and tested, but also has the capability of beginning in a small measure and then growing into more as God allows. For example, as Findlay gets "off the ground" they have a goal to help one family each month. Maumee, on the other hand, over time has blossomed into helping about three families each week and is now branching out to other parts of the metro-Toledo region.

Oh yes, we are welcoming the help of not only St. Charles parishioners but other Catholics in our area as well as any others who have the good will to love a neighbor in this way.

So, what is your next step? Why not come to an

informational meeting right here at St. Charles on Wednesday, May 27, from 6:30-7:30 p.m. in our Gathering Space. You will be able to hear representatives from Maumee and Findlay share the story of how things have begun and blossomed in their part of the diocese. You will be able to ask questions. You will be able to learn about the various ways in which volunteers can help make this happen. Not everyone has to be a heavy-lifter or truck driver! OTS has a special task for anyone with a heart for living the Gospel mandate to shelter the homeless.

I have learned that Bishop Thomas has personally taken part in this ministry helping a family move into their own home. It was so transformational that he has the hope this ministry can expand to the "four corners" of our diocese, including right here in Lima.

## Caring for Our School and Campus: Storm Damage and Summer Projects Update

In mid-March, our community experienced a significant windstorm that impacted much of Ohio, bringing sustained high winds with gusts reaching approximately 50–70 mph in our area. Unfortunately, St. Charles School was not immune to the effects of this storm.



We sustained damage to portions of the school roof, specifically the old gym roof and the smaller adjoining roof just to the south, which covers the school library. This damage occurred just prior to school dismissal, at a time when our power was also out. We are especially grateful that no one was injured, as the timing could have been much more serious.

We were not alone in experiencing the impact of this storm. Within our Catholic community, Lima Central Catholic also sustained



significant damage. We keep them in our prayers as they also work through their recovery efforts.

At the time of the initial storm, damage at St. Charles appeared to be limited to the exterior roofing materials. However, in the days and weeks that followed, additional storms and rain caused temporary coverings and protective wraps to fail, resulting in water intrusion and some interior damage within the school building as well.



We acted immediately to submit an insurance claim and are now working through the necessary next steps, including gathering repair estimates, consulting with contractors, and assessing the full scope of the

damage. In addition, we are coordinating closely with the Diocese of Toledo to follow required procedures and obtain approvals for repair work. This process ensures that all projects meet diocesan standards and that we are pursuing the most responsible and effective path forward.

Our hope is to finalize a plan in the coming months and complete the necessary repairs during the summer season, minimizing disruption to school activities.

### Looking Ahead: Summer and Fall Improvements

Even as we address these unexpected repairs, we are excited to continue moving forward with several planned improvements across our campus.

Most notably, the long-awaited elevator project is now entering a visible phase. As this issue reaches you, you should begin to see equipment and materials arriving on our church campus. Much of this activity will take place along the western or Cable Road side of the church, which may be temporarily blocked off or unavailable at times. We appreciate your patience and understanding as this important work begins. If all proceeds according to schedule, we anticipate having a new elevator in place by this fall.

In addition, we will begin Phase 3 of our sidewalk replacement project on the north and west side of the church. Once the elevator project is complete, all church sidewalks will have been replaced — resulting in a safer, more accessible, and more welcoming campus for all.

We share these updates to keep you informed and to thank you for your continued support and understanding. Whether addressing unexpected challenges or planning for the future, your generosity and commitment allow us to care for our parish and school in a thoughtful and responsible way.

Together, we continue to build and maintain a parish home that serves our community with safety, accessibility, and faith at its center.

**The Joy of Easter: Light, Hope, and New Life**

The Easter season is always a time of light, hope, and new life. This year, at St. Charles Borromeo Parish, that joy did not just shine — it sang, it laughed, and it danced a little, too. And yes, even heaven must have smiled.

**Holy Week Begins: A New Voice in the Parish**

From the very beginning of Holy Week, something special was in the air. On Holy Thursday, during the Mass of the Lord's Supper, the Haitian Catholic community took an active part for the very first time since joining the parish. With great enthusiasm — and maybe just a little holy nervousness — we joined voices with the parish choir and offered two beautiful songs in Haitian Creole: “*Lave m*” (“Wash me”) and “*Jezi sovè mape swiv ou*” (“Jesus, Savior, I will follow you”). And yes ... we brought a little Caribbean sunshine with us! Two hymns in Haitian Creole filled the church and, if you listened closely, you might have heard hearts smiling (and maybe even a few toes tapping quietly in the pews). Let's just say, if angels understand Creole, they were definitely singing along.

**Good Friday: Prayer in Haitian Creole**

On Good Friday at 3:00 p.m., we gathered again for the Stations of the Cross in Haitian Creole. It was simple, prayerful, and deeply moving. A few people followed quietly ... others tried to repeat the responses (with charming accents!). Faith, after all, does not require perfect pronunciation — just an open heart. Just as you kindly and patiently listen to me celebrate — and concelebrate — Mass each day in English, with my very distinctive French accent. Reading and speaking English may already bring a gentle smile, but it becomes even more enjoyable when I add a light-hearted story to lift the spirit and brighten every face. So, come and join us at the 8:00 a.m. Mass each morning, and begin your day with beauty, joy, and a happy heart.

**From the Cross to the Resurrection**

And so, from the quiet devotion of the Cross, our journey of faith gently unfolded into the radiant joy of the Resurrection.

**The Easter Vigil: The Queen of Liturgies**

Then came the great night: the Easter Vigil — already the “queen of all liturgies.” A night full of light, music, and powerful grace. The Haitian community

**Gratitude to Our Parish Community**

We take this moment to express our deep gratitude in the name of the Haitian Catholic Pastoral Community and all the faithful of St. Charles Borromeo Parish.

A very special thank you to Fr. Kent, our pastor, not only a spiritual shepherd, but also a remarkable administrator and organizer. (We are still wondering how he manages everything so calmly ... perhaps a little extra grace in his morning coffee?)

We also extend our sincere thanks to the PMT staff and to Miss Emily, our dedicated liturgy coordinator, for her support, patience, and attention to detail. Without you, our “organized joy” might have become just “joyfully disorganized.”

**A Growing Community of Faith**

For one year now, every Sunday from 3:00 to 4:15 p.m., we have been celebrating Mass in Haitian Creole. And people come from Bowling Green, Yorkshire, Findlay, and beyond. After Mass, we gather for refreshments, often generously offered by the Bruno family. Let's be honest: sometimes the fellowship is so warm, people almost forget to go home!

**Weekly Prayer and Spiritual Life**

Our activities continue throughout the week. Every Thursday from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m., we meet in small



groups before the Blessed Sacrament to meditate and pray Vespers in French — a quiet, beautiful moment of peace.

**Sacramental Growth and Hope for the Future**

From Easter 2025 to Easter 2026, we are blessed to have baptized 13 Haitian children. Many more are registered and preparing to receive this sacrament soon. The future is growing and it is full of hope.

**Joyful Invitations**

*Sunday, May 17* — A special gathering to celebrate the Haitian Flag Day (officially May 18), in unity with the Haitian Protestant community at the Nazarene Church, led by Pastor Franck Estalus. A beautiful sign of unity! Because joy grows when it is shared.

*June 27 at 10:00 a.m.* — Come celebrate with us the feast of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, patroness of Haiti. Bring your family, your friends, and even that neighbor who always asks, “What is that joyful music I hear on Sundays?”

*November 4 at 6:00 p.m.* — Join us for the Patronal Feast of St. Charles Borromeo. (The main celebrant? Still a surprise ... but trust us, it will be worth it!)

**An Open Invitation to Experience Haitian Liturgy**

Finally, we warmly invite you — yes, you reading this — to come and discover the beauty of Haitian Creole liturgy. It is vibrant, prayerful, welcoming ... and sometimes unexpectedly funny. Faith can be deep and joyful at the same time. To all Haitians living in Ohio: Thank you for your presence, your faith, your courage, and your culture. You are a gift to the Church.

Easter reminds us: Christ is risen — and so is our hope, our unity, and our joy. And if you ever hear singing in Creole that makes you smile ... don't worry, you're in the right place. And then, if you have never experienced a liturgy in Haitian Creole, consider this your personal invitation. Come discover its beauty — its depth, its rhythm, its heartfelt prayer. You may come out understanding only a few words, but you will leave understanding joy. Because in the end, faith has a language everyone understands: Love, community, and a reason to smile.

### Confirmation Preparation for Rising Eighth Graders

As we look ahead to the coming year, we want to share some important information with families of current seventh grade students who will be entering eighth grade next school year regarding the Sacrament of Confirmation.

We are excited to announce that Confirmation for this group of students will be celebrated on **Sunday, November 22nd, at 2:00 p.m.** here at **St. Charles**. This is an important change from what families may have experienced in the past, so we wanted to get the information out as early as possible: **Confirmation will take place in the fall**, not the spring of 2027.

### More Than a Date on the Calendar

Confirmation is not just an event we schedule; it is a moment in a young person's faith journey when the Church asks them to pause, pray, and reflect on how the Holy Spirit is already at work in their lives. Our hope is that this season of preparation helps students grow not only in knowledge but in confidence, trust, and relationship with Christ.

To support that journey, we invite students into

our **Confirmation Discernment Process**, which focuses on accompaniment, mentorship, and meaningful community. This process is designed to meet students where they are and walk with them as they continue to discover who God is calling them to be.

At the heart of this process are small groups. These groups create space for real conversation, prayer, and connection with peers and adult mentors who care deeply about their faith. **Registration is now open** and small groups are currently forming. Registering early helps us place students well and ensures that each group can be formed intentionally. The deadline for registration is **May 20th, 2026**.

Celebrating Confirmation in the fall offers a unique and meaningful opportunity for our young people. Rather than viewing Confirmation as something that "wraps up" the year, Fall Confirmation invites students to begin the year rooted in grace and strengthened by the Holy Spirit.

The start of a new school year is already a season of transition. New classes, new routines, and new responsibilities naturally invite reflection and growth. Receiving Confirmation during this time allows students to step into those changes knowing they are not doing so alone. The gifts of the Holy Spirit are not meant to be received at the end of the journey, but **to equip them for what lies ahead**.

Fall Confirmation also helps reinforce an important truth: Confirmation is not a graduation from

faith formation, but a deeper entry into the life of the Church. By celebrating the sacrament early in the year, we are able to walk with our newly confirmed students as they continue in small groups, mentorship, and parish life, allowing the grace of the sacrament to be lived out in real and tangible ways.

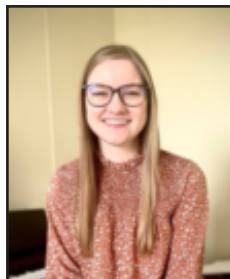
This timing gives students the chance to immediately practice what they have received by serving, praying, growing in leadership, and learning how to listen to the voice of the Holy Spirit in their everyday lives. The sacrament becomes not just a moment they remember, but a foundation they build upon throughout the year.

Ultimately, Fall Confirmation reminds us that the Holy Spirit is given not when we are "finished," but when we are ready to step forward in faith. It is a beginning, not an ending, and a powerful way to start the year grounded in God's grace.

As plans continue to take shape, including schedules, parent meetings, and retreat opportunities, additional information will be shared.

I hope and pray that our musical fasting during the season of Lent led your celebration of Easter to be all the more anticipated, exuberant, and profound in your heart and spirit. A word on my heart this Lent was "yearn." By definition, to yearn is "to have an intense, deep longing or desire for something, often something unattainable, lost, or distant. It implies a passionate emotional craving, frequently associated with nostalgia or tenderness." I pray that this Lent gave your heart the gift of yearning. Yearning for the joy that Christ's resurrection alone supplies. Yearning for the "nostalgia" to return again to the resurrection life we know. Yearning to be away from darkness in the freedom of Christ's light, but also yearning to continue to live as much in union with Christ's heart as we did during the Lenten season, entering into his darkest hour with Him, who did such for us.

It is impossible to yearn for something that we already have. Therefore, through the power of our Lenten musical fasting, our hearts are given the opportunity to yearn anew. The unification of our wills to Christ's for that 40-day period is now met with the greater and triumphant 50-day period of the Easter Season! We celebrate each of these 50 days as if they were Easter itself: "The fifty days from the Sunday of the Resurrection to Pentecost Sunday are celebrated in joy and exultation as one feast day, indeed as one 'great Sunday.'" The liturgies of Holy Week are the ultimate preparation for Christ's resurrection. As music director, there is so much opportunity, so much grace, so much reliance on the Holy Spirit in preparing and planning those liturgies. Each year, I am inspired to make these

liturgies new in some way. There are many traditions which keep these liturgies familiar for us, but it is also necessary that these liturgies represent our present-day experience of yearning for Christ. One way to do this musically is by our liturgies being embellished with the specific gifts and talents of our very parish. We yearn for Christ through the specific and unique "voice" of our particular parish and the community God has brought together here.

I would like to particularly mention and thank some people who have given their specific gifts in a such a way for this year's Holy Week liturgies to be made new. First and foremost, our adult choir: A leader is only as good as those who choose to collaborate with them in bringing their vision to life, and I have our adult choir to thank for their phenomenal dedication to that purpose. I also thank Jean Fortune for his fantastic direction and leadership of the Haitian community choir who embellished our Holy Thursday and Easter Vigil liturgies in a new way with their beautiful and expressive music. And Father Bertholy for guiding our collaboration to go so smoothly. I thank Evan Barr who beautifully arranged the text of *Crux fidelis*, the Church's preferred text to be sung on Good Friday for adoration of the Cross, into a musical piece for our choir. I thank Mike and Angie Herzog whose husband-wife duo was so beautifully done for our 8:00 a.m. Easter Day Mass. I thank Doug Daley, Ryan Utendorf, Marianne Schmenk, and Olivia Cox who gave such a beautiful ensemble instrumentation to both our Easter Day liturgies. I thank Ann Cox and Evan Barr (and Kevin Kidd, Evan's sponsor) for their faithful service in the adult choir throughout Holy Week despite the busy schedule they carried with also coming into the church this Easter Vigil! I thank Kevin Kidd who so dutifully keeps up with all the needs our piano presents and keeps it sounding brand new! I thank Gino Dimattia who faithfully offers his service to our music ministry in new ways each year, even when that's just helping me to get all our worship aids printed in time!

Although these are some of the ways that were specifically "new" to this year's Holy Week liturgies, I express my deepest gratitude to all who gave their time and talent in any way to make our Holy Week liturgies the beautiful and profound gift to our parish that these liturgies are. I pray that Christ was nearer to you in your yearning than ever before. God bless you this Easter season and always!!

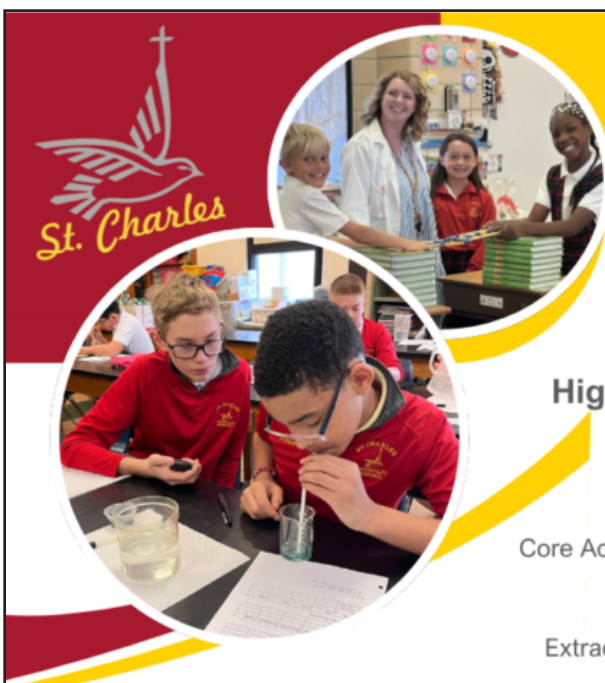

## Kindergarten Holy Thursday Retreat

Our Holy Thursday Retreat taught our kindergarten students about the events of the entire day and the significance of The Last Supper. The students experienced the humility and service of Jesus washing the disciples' feet (John 13) by having Mrs. Mahler wash their feet. It is a profound act of humility, love, and service, setting a direct example of servant leadership. By performing the duty of a slave — washing dirt-caked feet before Passover — Jesus showed that true greatness lies in serving others, symbolizing spiritual cleansing, and setting a new command to love.



### Why the Act Was Surprising:

*Reversal of Roles:* A rabbi or master (Jesus) did not wash the feet of his disciples (students). This was a task for the lowest servant or the disciples themselves, making the act jarring.

*Peter's Objection:* Simon Peter's initial refusal ("You shall never wash my feet") highlights the unexpected nature of a holy figure humbling himself in this manner.

### Historical Context:

*Cultural Duty:* In the ancient Middle East, walking in sandals on dusty roads required foot washing upon entering a home. It was a common, necessary act of hospitality.

Our students learned about the significance and symbolism of this experience:

*Humility and Service:* By taking the position of a servant, Jesus demonstrated that leaders should serve their followers, not dominate them.

*Symbolic Cleansing:* When Peter protested, Jesus stated, "Unless I wash you, you have no part with me," highlighting the washing as a symbol of spiritual cleansing from sin.

*A New Commandment:* This act illustrated the "new commandment" that followers should love and serve one another, just as Jesus loved them.

*Anticipation of the Cross:* The act of removing his garments and washing feet anticipated Jesus taking his life for his followers.

*The Last Supper:* This occurred at the beginning of the Passover Festival, adding emotional and spiritual weight to his final acts with his disciples.

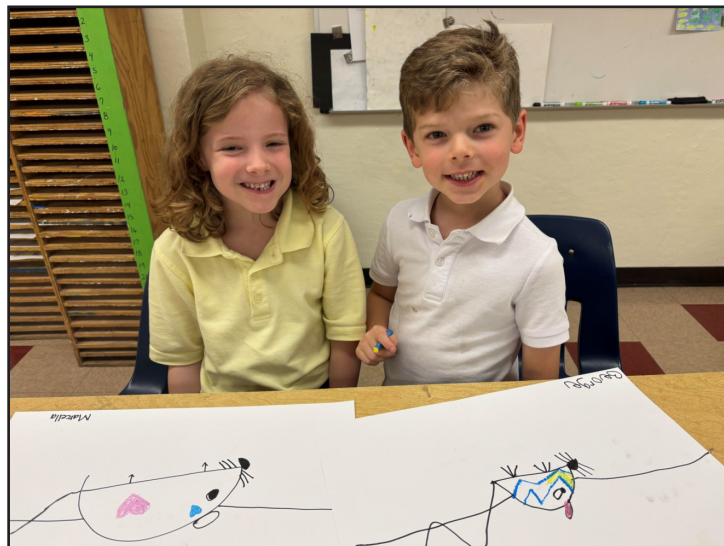
